The University has grown from 3 departments in the year 2011 to 19 functional departments, 2 Research Centers, 1 Research Chair running at present from Temporary Academic Block situated at Sainik Colony, Jammu with the main campus situated at Bagla (Rahya-Suchani), district Samba. Despite the challenges faced by the University, it has been able to provide all basic facilities essential for promoting the teaching-learning process. For attracting students and faculty from all over the country. The University is continuously showing a visible upward trend in terms of research output, community out-reach activities, capacity building programmes for local entrepreneurs, identifying and registering the grass-root level innovators through innovation cell and University Business Incubation Centre. A brief summary of all the activities and developments has been incorporated in the Self Study Report along with the SWOC analysis in the Executive Summary.

University strives for inculcating global competencies viz-a-viz learner-centric teaching, research in emerging areas and well organised extension activities. Pedagogical interventions and application of ICT blended teaching learning as well as e-governance driven processes, are being practised. The urge for attaining excellence is guided by the vision and the very mission of the institution.

Executive Summary

The Central University of Jammu was established by the Central Universities Act 2009 (Act No 25 of 2009) read with the Central Universities (Amendment) Act, 2009 (Act No. 38 of 2009) w.e.f. October 20, 2009 having its territorial jurisdiction extending over Jammu division of the state of Jammu and Kashmir. However, The Central University of Jammu actually came into existance on 08th August 2011. Presently the University is offering 16 Post Graduate, 04 five year integrated courses, 18 research programmes besides 02 vocational programmes at Under-Graduate level (B. Voc.) and 01 Diploma course is being offered under Community College in collaboration with VLCC. The University is running 10 Post Graduate programmes from its main campus along with its administrative block which is also situated in the main campus at Rahya-Suchani. Rest of the programmes are being offered from Temporary Academic Block situated in the heart of the city. The Central University of Jammu aspires to be one of India's leading Universities offering innovative, responsive and high quality educational opportunities at the under graduate, post-graduate and doctoral levels. We aim to enable individuals to realize and develop their physical and intellectual potential to their fullest, and promote social and human values by facilitating the pursuit of knowledge and academic excellence.

The Central University of Jammu currently operates from its Temporary Academic Block which has 30,000sq.ft constructed area and the upcoming campus at Bagla, which has 610 acres land. The University has two Auditoriums equipped with audio - video system and total seating capacity of 300, as well as two conference-cum-meeting rooms with audio video interface. The University provides ICT based infrastructure across all departments, the class rooms have projectors and audio source for interactive learning. The supporting facilities on the campus are being developed to contribute an effective ambience for curricular, extra-curricular and academic activities. The library is having excess to leading journals through UGC-infonet and dellnet. The University also provides separate hostel facilities for boys and girls with all the necessary amenities. Facilities like Wi-Fi, reading room, separate common rooms, 24 hrs power backup, educational tour, book exhibition, job fair, picnic and medical facilities etc. are also provided to the students.

The University has entered into an academic collaboration with the Institute of Chinese Studies, Delhi, Indian Institute of Tourism and Travel Management, Gwalior, Jammu Chamber of Commerce and Industries, Jammu. Also, three Central Universities viz. Kashmir, Himachal Pradesh and Jammu have signed a tripartite MoU for horizontal and vertical mobility of students, credit transfer and faculty exchange, joint research projects etc. The University is also having membership of professional bodies like NHRDN, ISTD, IATO, ITC, AIMA, CII etc., for strengthening its industry-academia interface.

The main features followed by the University include the following:

Quality maintenance:

All activities of the University can be grouped into three categories: admissions, teaching-learning process and examinations. At all levels, highest level of transparency is exercised. For admission to each course, national level test is conducted by Collegium of 08 Central Universities(CUCET). Highly advanced IT based system is

in place for evaluation of the test and every bit of information is placed on the CUCET website. The teaching-learning process is student centric where the curriculum is strictly based on Choice Based Credit System, as per latest UGC guidelines. Plans, programmes and activities, the results of the examinations conducted, the progress of the students is periodically reviewed at the level of Departments / Board of Studies, and other such bodies. The role-playing matrix for the examination process rests upon continuous evaluation, transparency, scrupulous, adherence to the declared time-schudule, objectivity and fairness. Setting of question papers is done with the guiding principle of promoting understanding of the matter rather than rote learning. All results are declared as per the schedule in the academic calender. The University since its inception is showing answer-scripts to the students thus eliminating the process of re-evaluation which facilitates the declaration of results within the stipulated time period. The transparency strengthens the faith of the students in the evaluation system followed by the University.

The University has a bottom up system of regulating and eliciting opinions in policy-making and decision making of all the issues at hand through community interface. In this way, a healthy, inherent and democratic system prevails in the practices of the University. The University Act, statutes, ordinances and regulations are followed in the organization, for which regular meetings as a procedure is adhered to. All positions are filled in after advertising at the national level and inviting experts in the selection committee from all over the country. In the selection process, merit remains the guiding principle as reflected in the teaching faculty, across disciplines, from as many as 17 states of the country.

Gender sensitization:

In the backdrop of the convention to end all forms of discrimination against women, the University has constituted a committee for Sensitisation, Prevention and Redressal of Sexual Harassment (SPARSH) in line with the Vishaka guidelines of 1998 and recently enacted Sexual Harassment Act at Workplace, 2013. Further the University has also selected gender champions for creating awareness amongst target audience. The committee has so far organised various workshops, counselling sessions and is organising self defence programmes under SAKSHAM project of UGC.

Energy conservation:

Use of LED and CFL lights, Power Factor Control, are some of the technologies used to conserve energy on the campus. The upcoming campus of the University is working on Green Campus concept to achieve GREHA 5 star ratings. It has been started with an objective to make Central University of Jammu a green University and make the students and staff aware about the sustainable use of electricity. In order to control landslides and prevent soil erosion using geo-synthetics and mapping of soil slopes.

The academic activities of the University across seven criteria of NAAC have been summarised and briefly presented below:

I. Curricular Aspect

Central University of Jammu intends to facilitate pursuit of knowledge and academic excellence in higher education with emphasis on promoting social and human values by enabling the students to realize and develop

their physical and intellectual potential. The University at present offers 15 Post Graduate, 4 integrated UG-PG Programmes, 8 Integrated M.Phil.-Ph.D programmes, 12 Ph.D programmes besides 02 Vocational programmes at Under-Graduate level (B. Voc.) and 01 Diploma course is being offered under Community College in collaboration with VLCC, all of which imbibe vision and mission of the University. These programmes cover the wider scope of basic knowledge of disciplines and interdisciplinary areas of contemporary relevance, like Human Resource Management, Tourism and Travel Management, Public Administration, Social Work, Mass Communication, National Security Studies, Education, Computer Science, Environment Sciences, Applied Mathematics, Economics, English and Hindi. Value added programmes are also offered under National Skill Qualification Framework having multiple exit points like B. Voc. and Programme on Beauty and Wellness under Community College. The University lays special emphasis on new teaching and learning pedagogy focusing on shift from transactional mode to transformational mode of teaching. Frequent workshops on soft skills and personality development are embedded as part of almost all the programmes offered by the University.

The University follows a systematic process for design and development of curriculum where each course syllabus is drafted by group of subject matter experts as per UGC/Regulatory Body guidelines. It is initially reviewed at departmental level which is later deliberated upon during Board of Studies and School Board meeting for improvisation and finalization. This process ensures that the curriculum is aligned with the industry requirements, is more job oriented, knowledge rigorous and meet needs of the society.

Feedback from the stakeholders such as the industry professionals, experts in academia and research, as well as students are collected and analyzed during need assessment through a structured mechanism, while designing and revising the curriculum. This has a catalytic impact for the University to keep pace with the dynamic needs of the industry and the society at large. Besides these measures, syllabi are also sent to various experts from industry and academia of national and international repute, for their time-to-time inputs on the same. The University also ensures complete academic flexibility by offering courses as per latest CBCS scheme.

Realizing the importance of strengthening entrepreneurship for national development, the University has set up Innovation, Incubation and Entrepreneurship Council (IIEC). It aims to nurture the innovative ideas of the entrepreneurs in emerging technological and knowledge based innovative ventures by providing necessary mentoring, promoting IP ecosystem and providing entrepreneurs a platform to commercialize their ideas.

Few Schools/Departments/Centre of contemporary academic relevance have been proposed by the University for next academic session focusing on Earth & Space Application, supported by Ministry of Earth Sciences, Mathematics, Education and Research, supported by Department of Atomic Energy, Disaster Management, under NDMA, Government of India, Yoga Centre, Deen Dayal Upadhyay KAUSHAL KENDRAS, supported by UGC, HRD Centre, supported by UGC, Kendriya Vidhyalaya, supported by MHRD. University has also approved various programmes in which online courses will be offered for benefitting students by leveraging technology using MOOC platform under SWAYAM.

II. Teaching-Learning and Evaluation

Since Teaching, Learning and Evaluation are the backbone of the University, ostensibly, constant efforts have been made to bring balanced representation in student population and to provide reservation as per the UGC rules. Moreover, extensive admission policy catering to the needs of diverse students, is followed. University organizes induction program for freshers both at departmental as well as University level and students are provided welcome kits.

Teachers from all departments meticulously plan and organize teaching schedules and put up the same on the University website, well in advance. Teachers make all efforts to make learning student-centric, with major thrust on experimental and participative learning, by emphasizing problem solving. As far as faculty is concerned, the University has a well qualified faculty. Diversity in recruitment of faculty is ensured. Faculty recharging strategies are in place, facilities like mobility of faculty through exchange programme as per MoU signed between three Central Universities is already being practiced. This system makes it possible for both the faculty and the students to learn constantly by upgrading and replenishing their capacities so as to exhibit the very best. Remedial coaching classes are conducted for students lagging behind in academics, by collecting data of academically poor students, reviewing their performance at various stages which include class-tests, assignments, interaction, oral examination etc. The inherent inhibitions among the students act as a drag worked out by offering them continual exposure to open debates and discussions.

Apart from regular teaching, experts and eminent persons are often invited for variety of academic purposes. The faculty and students make use of ICT, smart classrooms and rich library resources, which include online resources with the help of NKN connectivity. Emphasis is laid on quality education by encouraging the institution to adopt multimedia approach in teaching-learning process. Both the students and the faculty are exposed to advanced levels of knowledge and skills mainly through the utilization of internet skills. The institution encourages the staff to undertake research activities and pursue doctoral research. Faculty members are deputed to attend guest lectures, national and international seminars and training programmes for updating their knowledge. Not only this, the goal of bringing out creativity of the students is met by harnessing their talent by showcasing it in the form of extra-curricular activities like UDAAN, Environment day, Annual Day Celebration, Alumni Day etc.

Needless to say, the examination system has also witnessed improvement in recent years by following continuous evaluation, internal assessment and speedy declaration of results. Technology is extensively used in the preparation and compilation of results. The University strictly follows an academic calendar for conduct of diverse activities and examinations. The system is totally transparent and internal at each step, thus eliminating the need of re-evaluation. A Grievance-Redressal cell is also constituted which looks after the grievances of students about the evaluation system. Bringing reforms in the examination system by taking feebdback from faculty, students and other stakeholders, is a regular practice. The feedback is analysed and remedial correction is done after discussing the same subject wise in faculty meetings.

The students are often sent to the places where job fests / business fests are organized by reputed institution and

leading companies. Feedback is taken from different sources such as students and the organizers of the job fest / business fests as it serves as the surest learning outcome.

III. Research, Consultancy and Extension

This criteria is devoted towards research, consultancy and extension. The University accords high priority for providing the very best research facilities through grant of research projects, facilitating teachers and scholars for pursuing their research work with academic and financial support. The University has constituted a committee to review the status of research work, screen best publications, grant financial support in form of minor research projects to the tune of Rs 3 lakh for each Department. The University follows minimum standards for award of Integrated M.Phil-Ph. D degree. Every registered scholar is granted a fellowship of Rs 5000 to M.Phil and Rs. 8000 to Ph. D scholars besides grant of fellowship to JRF. The teachers are provided financial support for attending conferences, seminars and workshops. The University is in the process of building a sound consultancy and collaborations are therefore being explored at National and International level.

IV. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The Central University of Jammu currently operates from its Temporary Academic Block situated at Sainik Colony, Jammu which has 30,000 sq. ft constructed area and the upcoming campus situated at Bagla, Samba which has 610 acres of land. The current infrastructure developed includes a centrally air-conditioned administrative and academic block at Bagla. The University has one Auditorium equipped with AV systems and total seating capacity of 300. It also has three conference cum meeting rooms with AV interface. The Central University of Jammu provides ICT based infrastructure across all departments. The class rooms have projectors and audio source for interactive learning. The supporting facilities on the campus are developed to contribute the effective ambience for curricular, extra-curricular and academic activities. The Central University of Jammu has a fully equipped medical room in TAB and main campus in which full time doctor and medical assistants have been appointed. An ambulance is also available round the clock. The University has a central library which is automated with KOHA. The library also provides access to e-resources through INFLIBNET. The library has a seating capacity of 110 with access to the internet along with photocopy and printing facilities for the students. The library has 12,000 books approx. and adds 4800 books annually on an average. The library makes subscription to leading e-journals like JSTOR, EPW, SPRINGER etc. Smart cards have also been issued to the students and faculty. The University also provides separate hostel facilities for boys and girls with all the necessary amenities like Internet facility, reading room, common room, 24 hrs power backup, and medical facilities. From the total annual budget of the university, a provision is kept for infrastructural development and ICT facilities.

V. Student Support and Progression

Student support services are important for the better growth and development of the students within an institution. Students encounter major transitions related to their higher education experience and to provide favourable environment during this phase of life, considerable support is available for their progression i.e. a broad range of student support services and activities that enhance the learning process in and out of the

traditional classroom. Taking all these things into consideration, Central University of Jammu has taken steps to strengthen these kind of activities within the institution. The University has student grievance redressal mechanism which gives students essential support to resolve their issues, which are academic as well as nonacademic in nature. In order to make University fraternity sensitized towards gender-"SPARSH" i.e Sensitization, Prevention and Redressal of Sexual Harassment cell has been constituted under which University has constituted a University Complaints Committee (UCC) in order to address the issues and complaints filed by the students or employees of the University. The Equal Opportunity Cell of the University ensures every person an equal opportunity at all levels irrespective of any caste, religion, race, creed, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, genetic information, marital status, age, minorities, economically weaker section or disability. Also, the development of soft skills is a crucial part of fostering a dynamic workforce, and in this regard students of Central University of Jammu are counselled at regular intervals regarding career opportunities as well as the choice of courses to opt for within and outside the department. The University provides individual and group counselling to the students along with field visits where their learning in the field is mentored by faculty and an agency personnel. Regular activities like Dissertation, Group Activities, Friday Clubs, Soft Skills Enhancement programs have been initiated in the departments as regular feature to groom students professional skills. Along with all these initiatives, attention is also paid to other aspects such as spoken english, computer literacy, personality development etc. by encouraging the students to speak in English and complete the assignments by using computers. The University also offers remedial classes to the students belonging to SC, ST, OBC, PWD and economically weaker sections of society for their welfare. The purpose behind this is to make them more competent and confident for the outer world. The range of activities like UDAAN, Annual Sports Meet has been organized by the University for the overall development of the students. The students of Integrated M.Phil-P.hD. are encouraged to participate in seminars, workshops and publish their research papers. A newsletter titled "Travelism" is under process of publication along with University newsletter 'Campus Update' which is being published. The University has initiated the feedback system both from the students as well as the faculty, for ensuring quality education. To safeguard the interest of the students from loss and uncertainty, various student welfare measures have been adopted by the institution. Accidental Medical Insurance up to Rs. 50,000/- is available for students of the University. University scholarship is provided to every registered scholar from each department, free bus services for the student and faculty is provided. Health Centre with qualified doctor and medical attendant is also available. Digitization process of the University makes its information publicly accessible. The syllabus and scheme consisting of details of evaluation process of each programme is displayed on the University website so that the students, teachers and all other stakeholders can easily access the required information. In order to attract foreign students, an International Student Cell has been established by the University and communication in this regard has been provided to different embassies. The Central Placement Cell of Central University of Jammu endeavours to facilitate and provide suitable placement to students in reputed multinationals, Government Organisations, NGO's and the corporate sector. For promoting leadership qualities among students, steps have been initiated to establish a student council, wherein they can learn qualities like team building, resource utilization, confidence building etc.

VI. Governance, Leadership and Management

Vision of the good leaders in the path of institutional building plays a very significant role. The far-sightedness of the leadership of Central University of Jammu is reflected in its vision and mission which clearly aspires for high echelons in academics as well as to engage in the progress and development of society. In spite of the fact that the University is in its nascent stage, it aspires to set a standard for its stakeholders and their overall growth, so that they can deliver an effective service to the society, which the 'mission' outlines explicitly. It desires to engage with the society at various levels in order to advance the progress and development of humanity through innovation. The leadership in collaboration with the statutory bodies is actively engaged in shaping the policies and future action plans to match the standards set by the University through its vision and mission. While doing so, a bottom-up approach is exercised by the Vice-Chancellor in inviting any suggestions from any of the stakeholders at anytime and interacts with them quite frequently. In order to inculcate sound value system among University fraternity, all national days like Independence Day/ Republic Day/ Gandhi Jayanti/ Unity Day are celebrated with active participation from faculty and students which helps to foster national values among them. In the course of development of policies and strategies for teaching and learning process, Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) has been introduced. To review the said process on regular basis provision of student's feedback, internal assessment and continuous evaluation have been made compulsory. The University also conducts eminent lectures by reputed speakers from various disciplines to foster competencies among the students. The curriculum of all the Departments is reviewed regularly to meet the global requirements. The University has also constituted grievances cell and anti ragging committee to address the complaints from students and scholars and a committee to address the grievances of gender related issues called 'SPARSH'. Such committees as stated above are actively engaged in sensitizing the students, scholars, faculty and staff about gender issues and maintaining ragging free atmosphere in the campus. Understanding the need to ensure quality in all academic and administrative activities, the University has established a separate Internal Quality Assurance Cell which was formulated in the year 2014 to monitor, guide and suggest the quality improvements required with respect to various quality related parameters of the University. IQAC is actively engaged in setting up quality standards of the University. The feedback process is in place. Also, it is in the process of establishing quality radar at the University by organising 'Best Department' competition amongst the Departments. The IQAC has nominated an IQAC co-ordinator from each Department, who helps in maintaining the requisite records at the Departmental level similarly ICAQ co-ordinator nominated from Administrative staff helps in maintaining quality standards at the administrative level. Meetings are held regularly for maintaining quality standards and parameters at the University.

VII. Innovations and Best Practices

The campus of Central University of Jammu is being developed following the GRIHA 5 guidelines with measures to ensure reduced consumption of energy and water resources. To make the campus eco-friendly, measures on energy efficiency, water efficiency, renewable energy and water efficient landscaping have been largely incorporated. Most of the buildings and habitable working spaces have North-South (\pm 15 degrees) orientation, so as to maximize gains for natural light into habitable spaces where autoclaved aerated concrete (AAC) block have been provided over brick walls, so as to minimize heat gain into the building spaces and thereby reducing energy consumption in cooling spaces. This practice is supplemented by maximizing use of

sunlight, solar water heating, use of energy efficient lights to ensure the reduced consumption of energy as far as possible. To ensure sustainable and smart use of water, the University has constructed many water harvesting pits, Five Water bodies are being created in the campus with a total water harvesting capacity of 80 Lakh Gallons through Watershed Development Programme. The provision for Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting is under progress however use of RO rejected water for Gardening purpose is already in operation. To maximize the use of renewable energy, the University has adopted the use of solar energy by installing the Solar Energy Panels on the roof top of its buildings which is under progress, however solar street lights have also been/are being installed. The installation of solar water heaters at the roof top of the hostels are also being planned to incorporate renewable energy over conventional form of energy. Thick green belt of adequate width has been raised in the campus with incorporation of native species of plants/trees. The University is also adopting a Water Efficient Landscaping with designated plant/tree species.

For administering and functioning of the University, a key innovation has been the use of technology in all aspects of Institute administration. Some of the following Innovative practices are being adopted or are under progress at the Central University of Jammu which includes use of Building Management System (BMS) for HVAC control, Email groups, Email based administration, Shared documents and Google Drive, ERP and Coir based eco friendly duster. A few of the best practices which are operational at the Campus of Central University of Jammu includes:

- Learner centric course design and delivery
- National Tourism Entrepreneurship Development Summit (NTEDS)
- Evaluation system is very transparent and objective.
- CBCS as per UGC guidelines with interdisciplinary orientation
- ICT/Automated library
- Prompt Medical facility

The University is in the process of introducing the following other best practices:

- Use of Recycled Paper
- Computer Procurement Policies
- Use of Reusable Bottles
- Use of Green Cleaning Products

Further, the University strives hard for placing the students to quote, 2-day mega placement drive under the aegis of NSDC was conducted at Central University of Jammu, Temporary Academic Block, Sainik Colony, Jammu on 29th May, 2016. The event was witnessed by over 170 participants from different parts of the State including the in-house students of various departments of Central University of Jammu. Some of the Corporates who participated on both days of this mega recruitment drive included; Multicare; NISA; Orion Security; Safexpress; Suntech Infra Solutions; Surya Wires; Tata Motors; Premier Shield and Rooman Technologies. The corporates represented a wide range of sectors like Security Services, IT, ITES, Hospital Management, Infra, Automobile Sector, Logistics, etc. Also, students of professional courses have been placed in reputed companies for internship. 21 students of Department of HRM & OB were offered stipend of Rs. 21,000/- per month.

SWOC Analysis of the University

STRENGTHS:

- The University has maintained its identity by setting up centre of excellence as per the contemporary trends and is trying to become a unique cultural centre with high principles of sustenance.
- The University offers education with least monetary burden on the students while at the same time it is offering a quality life and living on the campus.
- The University has maintained an astute awareness of the demands of the contemporary world and keeping that in view it is continuously initiating new courses.
- The attrition rate of the University is nearly zero amongst the staff members.
- The placement records of the professional courses has been healthy since its inception. The TTM Department has 100% placement record. MBA(HRM) Department has a record 100% placement with paid internships. Most of the students from the department are placed in reputed corporate houses with high packages.
- The classroom pedagogy including involvement of the students makes a significant component of the University's functioning.
- Well managed student discipline process is followed.
- The campus is Wi-Fi enabled, ICT savvy and has well maintained lawns, sports facility at Temporary Academic Block and proposed stadium at the main campus.
- Strong Industry-Academia Interface for curriculum design, internship and placements.
- Regular interaction with eminent experts through eminent lecture series.
- Focus on inculcating entrepreneurship amongst students and local community through innovation cell and University Business Incubation Centre.
- The University has started programmes for promoting Vocational Courses through Community College, B.Voc programme, which shall enhance employability among students. Skill Development component has been added all courses pursued in Central University of Jammu as per UGC guidelines on CBCS.
- The focus of the University is on enhancing the skills of the learners through various skill based value added courses. The University has laid its focus on Community Development, adopted a Panchyat viz, Jung under ULB programme of Govt. of India, adopted five villages and two schools. Bio-diversity Park has been created.
- A survey of flora and fauna of entire campus has been done and published in the form of a book.

WEAKNESSES:

- The University faces paucity of space as it is in process of constructing its own buildings to accommodate newly introduced courses and increasing number of students.
- The University still has to go a way ahead by developing state of the art infrastructure which would not only provide space for new courses but also help in preserving valuable resources in the form of manuscripts and other original documents.

- The University needs to make efforts for recognition, promotion and establishment of research centres for enabling research in various areas.
- The University still has to set a benchmark in attracting students globally though a few students from Eurepeon Union are likely to visit University campus under student exchange programme.
- The University is yet to conduct Green Audit, Disability Audits etc.
- The University has a formalised feedback system but has to adopt a self improving system as it lacks a proper internal appraisal mechanism and relies only on UGC API pattern for appraising the faculty members.

OPPORTUNITIES:

- The University has capability to be graded as 'A Class' University.
- The University provides ample opportunities for students to grow in a holistic manner through a cultural, intellectual and extra-curricular exposure in a healthy environment.
- The University has opportunities to offer to its budding citizens with an exposure of community development and welfare.
- The University nurtures the classical oriental languages and literatures and also provides opportunities to the budding entrepreneurs through its Business Incubation Centre.

CHALLENGES:

- Tapping and processing funds for development of new buildings.
- Encouraging productive research.
- Harness energy of alumni for their "Time, Talent and Treasure" by generating employability for the students.
- The University has to distinguish itself at National and International level and attain excellence in field of research and consultancy.
- The University has to become a hub of academic pursuits to cater to the diverse needs of the students in all emerging disciplines of knowledge.
- The construction of academic blocks at faster speed is one of the biggest challenge.
- The University has to strive for creating an ambience and congenial atmosphere for the learners to have a sense of pride for the students of the University.
- The University intends to shift from temporary block to main campus for giving a feel of the Campus to the students at one place where they shall coordinate and enjoy all facilities of the University in a holistic manner.

1.1 Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 How is the institutional vision and mission reflected in the academic programmes of the university?

Vision

"To be a leading Centre of higher learning, integrating culture, knowledge, philosophy and value system of our heritage with modern and emerging concepts, skills and technology and management practices."

Mission

- Impart education which in its breath and scope represents the three main symbols in our logo; iridescent like the rising Sun, immortal as the Banyan Tree and infinite like the Sky.
- Inculcate self-confidence; which when combined with disciplined study, leads to faith in one's strength and conviction.
- Develop talent for sustainable growth in academics, administration, business and research by laying emphasis on organised thought, self discipline and discriminative faculty.
- Encourage inter-disciplinary focus, and also collaborative research with leading Institutions aimed at the optimum development of human resource and integration of new ideas and innovations.
- Provide a modern, environmentally sustainable, healthy and vibrant Campus in consonance with the principles of the Green Technology.
- Play participatory role in the affairs of the people of surrounding areas in particular and civil society in general.

Reflection in Academic Programmes

The first academic session (2011-12) commenced with three Post Graduate courses in English, Economics and Applied Mathematics at Temporary Academic Block-I (TAB-I) at Sidhra bypass road, Jammu. In the next academic session (2012-13), five PG Courses were added viz. Computer Science, Educational Studies, Environmental Sciences, Human Resource Management and Tourism & Travel Management which became operational from the Temporary Academic Block (TAB-II) at Sainik Colony-Extension. From the third session (2013-14), all the departments started functioning from TAB at Sainik Colony. Four new post graduate courses were introduced in the academic session (2014-15) viz. National Security Studies; Public Policy & Public Administration; Social Work and Mass Communication & New Media. Two undergraduate vocational courses in Retail and Tourism and one post graduate programme in Hindi was introduced in academic session (2015-16). Four new integrated programmes in Botany, Zoology, Chemistry and Physics as well as two new PG programmes in Material Science & Technology, Supply Chain Management were introduced in the academic session (2016-17) and one diploma programme in Beauty and Wellness under the aegis of Community College. The University also offered Integrated M-Phil-Ph.D programme in eight disciplines (till 2016) and Part time Ph. D. in two disciplines. From session 2016 onwards, University has started Full Time Ph. D. in 10 disciplines. The University is in the process of offering Post doctoral Programme.

All the academic programs of Central University of Jammu do imbibe vision and mission of the University. Out of the approved departments for the University, currently 21 are operational from two campuses as listed below and are functioning from Central University of Jammu main campus situated at Rahya- Suchani (Bagla), Samba as well as the Temporary Academic Block, situated at Sainik Colony, Jammu.

The curriculum in each discipline has been planned keeping in view the learning outcomes, global competencies and core values enshrined for higher learning attributes. The curriculum in each discipline under Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) enables students to gain insight towards global challenges, attain sense of working towards inter-disciplinary thinking, build scientific temper of mind, attain professional advancement, life skills and research orientation with a blend of co-curricular activities which further develops them competitively to seek employment. The curriculum further enables the students to attain requisite skills for entrepreneurship. The curriculum ensures to make students' flexible, competitive and gain competencies in different fields of specialisation.

In order to further attain the vision and mission, the University ensures to create a supporting system for faculty and students in following facets:

- (i) Studies in foundational and contemporary disciplines with focus on personality.
- (ii) Industry oriented curriculum blended with spirit of strong ethical values and Inter-disciplinary studies.
- (iii) Student centric teaching and learning pedagogy with special emphasis on shift from transactional mode to transformational mode of teaching.
- (iv) Use of ICT in improving teaching learning process.
 - The Central University of Jammu strives for the continual improvisation of performance and benchmarking against the best standards of excellence in teaching and research.
- 1.1.2 Does the university follow a systematic process in the design and development of the curriculum? If yes, give details of the process (need assessment, feedback, etc.).

The courses as well as curricula are periodically reviewed at departmental level keeping in view the advancement in technology, industrial needs, changes in national and international scenario. The systematic process that is followed in designing and development of curriculum includes need assessment, designing the initial draft of curriculum, feedback, improvisation and finalization.

Need Assessment: The curriculum is designed by the faculty members considering the guidelines and model curriculum of UGC, leading institution and industries. Inputs from various stakeholders are also

taken into account by conducting workshops etc. in order to get a better understanding of future needs. The content of the similar courses being offered by leading institutions are also considered. The experts visiting the departments also provide the assessment on the curriculum which too is useful for formulating the new syllabi.

Designing the initial draft of curriculum: The need and design of curriculum is further deliberated upon within the faculty members in departmental meetings under the chairmanship of Head of the Department and the initial draft of syllabus is finalized.

Feedback: The feedback about the curriculum is taken from the alumni and outgoing students of final year of each programme to revise and modify the gaps if any.

Decision of Board of Studies : The draft of curriculum is thoroughly discussed in the Board of studies meeting as well as School Board and inputs are incorporated. The feedback of experts from academic and industry is utilised for recommending the syllabi for final approval.

Improvisation and Finalization : The revised curriculum is finally approved by the Academic Council and is put into practice.

From the current academic session i.e. 2015-16, University is strictly following the latest CBCS as per UGC guidelines for design and development process of curriculum with emphasis on interdisciplinary, value based and skill based courses providing academic flexibility.

Besides above measures, University also sends the curriculum to external experts from industry and academia to get their time to time inputs on the same for ensuring enriched curricula in line with latest market trends. This further provides feedback for enriching the curricula.

Employability

The University realizes the importance of strengthening Entrepreneurship for national development and thus takes keen interest for developing entrepreneurial skills amongst the youth. The Central Placement Cell has been established by the University to provide quality placement opportunities for students. The Cell organizes various Skill development workshops like communication, personality development etc. to groom the students as per the requirement of the industries throughout the year. The departments also undertake placement activities at their level. The University frequently organizes interactive sessions with eminent academicians and industrialists so as to develop synergistic partnerships paving out ways for desirable employability of the students. Workshops on entrepreneurship are also conducted in collaboration with eminent bodies like JKEDI, so as to facilitate the budding entrepreneurial aspirations of the students. Since visualization of the institution from the curricula has lot of impact in establishing the industry-institution relationship and placements, the curriculum is designed keeping in view the need and requirements of the industry.

Teaching pedagogy is also emphasized to be based on case studies, student's involvement and participation which helps in holistic development of the students from employability skills perspective. The need assessment activity in the departments takes into account the options of employability through the various courses planned in coordination with Industry representatives. The industry academia cell frequently meets and guides for measures to be undertaken towards enhancing employability through different courses being taught.

Innovation

The University has established Innovation, Incubation and Entrepreneurship Council under which Innovation Cell and University Business Incubation Centre (UBIC) are functioning. *Innovation cell*

aims to reach out to grassroot innovators particularly in rural areas to record their knowledge and innovation, get them patented and disseminate them for the benefit of the society. *UBIC* nurtures the innovative ideas of the Entrepreneurs' in emerging technological and knowledge based innovative ventures by providing necessary mentoring, promoting Intellectual Property ecosystem and providing entrepreneurs a platform to commercialize their ideas. Besides, it facilitates in raising the seed capital from different financial institutions at subsidised rates and IP protection by helping them to register IPs. The UBIC is established for nurturing innovation in local resource endowments thereby helping in income and employment generation in the region. The objective of UBIC is to emerge as a Centre of excellence in incubating ideas.

The Central University of Jammu also emphasizes on usage of innovative management techniques and latest teaching pedagogy to educate students in the essential and emerging concepts, analytical frameworks, theoretical perspectives, and organizational environments and processes. The teaching and learning process relies on participation and interaction by using a mixed pedagogy i.e. case study, presentations, e-resources, lectures by eminent speakers from industry & academia. Innovative teaching techniques are encouraged by the University like teaching at field settings, out of classroom teachings etc.

Research

The Central University of Jammu aspires to be a leading institution of teaching, research, and professional development. The University offers Integrated M.Phil-Ph.D; programs and part time Ph.D. programmes to carry out quality research in the respective fields. Also, research methodology, IT and data analysis courses are integrated into course curriculum across various disciplines. Besides that, research based dissertations/projects/field work are an integral part of almost all post graduate programs. In some departments students are also exposed to presentations during club activities. The faculty is encouraged to undertake projects, make publications and attend workshops on various themes organised from time to time. Hands-on experience is also provided through practical orientation. The course work is formulated and taught as per guidelines of UGC for each programme.

1.2.2 Does the university/department have an explicit policy and strategy for attracting international students?

The Central University of Jammu accords high priority to attract the international students from various countries and this is evident from University's policy initiative by establishing an institutional structure viz **Office of International Affairs (OIA).** OIA working with the mandate of developing a coherent strategy to promote Central University of Jammu's International relations, global profile and International competitiveness. The OIA is promoting deeper academic engagements with key countries, International collaboration International internships.

In terms of explicit policy initiatives, the University has been proud member of United Nations Academia Impact (UNAI) of the United Nations. The Office of International Affairs is already working with 'Education Attaches' of various Diplomatic Missions and Central agencies, coordinating the University's international collaborations in close contact with the university leadership, various faculties and departments. The office is working out the modalities with Indian Council for Cultural Relations (ICCR), New Delhi and other Government of India Agencies in attracting and providing International scholarships and other incentives and is responsible for the University's bilateral agreements and participation in different networks and organizations.

1.2.3 Have any courses been developed targeting international students? If so, how successful have they been? If 'no', explain the impediments.

The regular courses offered by the Central University of Jammu, are in tune with the international standards offered by any other Indian University. Also, as per the directions of the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India from time to time, various Departments of the University are devising on-line courses keeping in view the domain specialisations. The Office of International Affairs is also developing ambitious course structure in collaboration with various International agencies working in India on the 'Study in India Program' (SIP) focusing a special component on the Jammu & Kashmir State in order to attract students from Europe and North America for short-term courses. Efforts have been made for the unprecedented visibility of the University at the international level, with several top institutions of the world coming forward to enter into academic partnerships. Attempts are being made to undertake joint research and teaching projects that allow credit transfers and grant of joint degrees to students in the areas of mutual benefit.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 How often is the curriculum of the university reviewed and upgraded for making it socially relevant and/or job oriented / knowledge intensive and meeting the emerging needs of students and other stakeholders?

Curriculum of the University is reviewed and updated periodically in order to align with the latest trends of academic arena as well as of industry. At the beginning, the syllabus for each course is drafted by group of subject matter experts which is then reviewed at departmental level periodically (at least once within three years). The syllabus and the agenda items are taken for approval on Board of Studies and School Board (the authorized bodies). There is an annual review of syllabus supplemented by average of two Board of Studies for every programme so as to ensure that the curriculum is aligned with the Industry requirements and becomes more job oriented, knowledge rigorous and meet the needs of society. Usually the experts in the Board of Studies are from academic front as well as the industry which helps to blend the theoretical as well as the practical aspects, hence enriching the curriculum to its best. The ordinances of the University bind the departments to hold at least two meetings of Board of Studies and two meetings of School Board annually where issues related to curriculum enrichment, research plans etc are discussed.

1.4 Feedback System

1.4.1 Does the university/department have a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students regarding the curriculum and how is it made use of?

Curriculum is generally revised periodically after taking feedback from various stakeholders like industry experts, academicians, students etc. University follows structured mechanism for taking the feedback from the students involving both formal and informal feedback.

Formal Feedback: At the end of each semester, students are given feedback forms wherein their inputs regarding curriculum are consolidated and considered for necessary modifications in curriculum, in line with requirements of changing dynamics of industry and society at large.

Informal Feedback: Students informally interact during classroom discussions with all faculty members to express their view point about curricula which are noted and evaluated at later stage during departmental meetings comprising of all faculty members chaired by Head of the Department.

The University maintains constant contact with both national and international faculty by inviting them for various workshops, conferences, seminars and discussions. These contacts are further strengthened by inviting the eminent academicians as members of Board of Studies where their feedback on curriculum is taken into consideration. Thus, the opinion of the external members of Board of Studies and School Board from academia and industry, national experts is also taken into consideration to review the syllabi. The syllabus formulated is sent to reputed national experts for their feedback on the relevance of syllabi for meeting global challenges.

1.4.3 Specify the mechanism through which affiliated institutions give feedback on curriculum enrichment and the extent to which it is made use of.

At present, there is no institution affiliated to the Central University of Jammu.

1.4.4 What are the quality sustenance and quality enhancement measures undertaken by the university/department in ensuring the effective development of the curricula?

The process of design and development of curriculum involves three major steps: Review, Revision and Ratification.

Review: Reviews are taken from students, faculty, industrialist as well as alumni. Faculty is encouraged to undergo orientation course, refresher course, conferences, seminars etc. so as to broaden their knowledge base regarding latest trends in their respective fields and to appraise them with industrial as well as societal requirements. Their inputs are considered in making the curriculum more effective and job oriented, keeping Quality assurance/Quality control issues in mind. Few departments also refer secondary literature about the issues and utilize the same for review.

Revision: Curriculum revision and /or introduction of new courses are undertaken based on the feedback/inputs received from students, faculty, alumni and employers.

Ratification: Departments periodically conduct at least two Board of Studies and School Board meetings to ratify the modifications which are finally placed before academic council for its consideration.

- Besides this, Public hoardings at prominent places are erected, SMS facility is used for Communicating the information to the public, all multi-media channels like FM Radio, local TV channels are sent for disseminating the information. For the session 2015-16 around One lakh SMS were sent to inform students about important dates.
- Information is also disseminated in local colleges of the region by making presentation by the Faculty about the courses offered by the university and their job prospects.
- Once the merit lists are prepared consisting of General, SC, ST, OBC, PWD categories, the same are displayed on University website and the criteria for determining the merit as per choice/preference of the students is published on the University website.
- Information is also displayed on Institutional Notice Boards.
- The admission is carried through counselling after determining the merit list of the candidates for each discipline. The students falling in the merit list are informed through telephonic calls, SMS and e-mails by the respective departments about the schedule of admission, required documents and fee details for seeking admission.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the process of admission put in place by the University. List the criteria for admission: (e.g.: (i) merit, (ii) merit with entrance test, (iii) merit, entrance test and interview, (iv) common entrance test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (v) other criteria followed by the University (please specify).

Admission is made through collegiums of 09 Central Universities (CUCET) on all India basis. The admission process is based on the components as per the weightages reflected in the table listed below.

Eligibility and composite score calculation of JRF/NET/SLET is done as per the following rules:

- No candidate securing less than 50% marks (45% in case of SC, ST and Persons with disabilities) in CUCET shall be eligible for admission to the Integrated M.Phil.-Ph.D. Programme.
- The JRF/NET/SET qualified candidates shall be exempted from CUCET for admission to Integrated M.Phil-Ph.D. Programmes. For the purpose of calculating composite score, JRF qualified candidates shall be deemed to have scored 100% marks in the CUCET whereas, the NET/SLET/SET qualified candidates shall be deemed to have scored marks equivalent to the marks scored by the topper of CUCET.
- Provided that if a JRF/NET/SLET/SET qualified candidate appears in the CUCET, at his/her own discretion, he/she shall be awarded the actual marks scored in the CUCET by him/her and he/she shall not be deemed to have scored 100% marks or the marks scored by the topper of the CUCET respectively as the case may be.
- Provided further that a candidate, who has passed Master's Degree Examination in an allied subject, shall have either to qualify JRF/NET/SLET/SET or the CUCET in the subject in which admission is sought.
- **Explanation:** For the purpose of this Clause "Topper of CUCET", means a candidate who is non JRF/NET/SLET/SET and has obtained the highest marks in the CUCET amongst the candidates who have applied for admission to the Central University of Jammu in the relevant category in which NET/SLET/SET qualified candidate will be eligible to be considered.
- Subject to the fulfilment of the minimum eligibility conditions for admission to an Integrated M.Phil.-Ph.D. Programme/Ph.D. Programme (2016-17) a teacher who has been awarded Teacher Research Fellowship by the UGC and is working in any institution of higher education shall be exempted from the requirement of appearing in CUCET and he/she shall be considered at par with NET/SLET/SET qualified candidates, for the purpose of calculating composite score.
- All candidates applying for admission to the CUJ, including those exempted from appearing in CUCET by the University (refer the University website) must apply, pay necessary fee and get registered for the Central Universities Common Entrance Test failing which their candidature will not be considered for admission.
- Subject to the minimum cut-off marks, candidates' equivalent to five times the number of seats shall be called for Interview strictly on the basis of merit of Cumulative Score of CUCET and marks obtained at the qualifying Master's Degree.
- The entire process of admission is published in prospectus which is posted on website of the university well in advance

2.1.3 Provide details of admission process in the affiliated colleges and the University's role in monitoring the same.

The Central University of Jammu has not been accorded mandate to affiliate colleges as on date.

2.1.4 Does the University have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profile annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

- The University reviews the process of admission every year initially at Departmental/school level followed by meeting of HODs/Deans and thereafter recommendations are placed before University bodies for further necessary action.
- The profile of the students is reviewed and analyzed to find out the all India character of students seeking admission into Central University of Jammu. They are also analyzed on the basis of merit, caste, religion, urban/rural, married/unmarried etc. which helps to understand the quality and type of the students seeking admission into the University.
- This further helps to make future plans for attracting more meritorious students belonging to all shades of the society across the country.
- The University has witnessed a new phenomenon with respect to the composition of the students seeking admission in PG and research programs which is evident from the fact that in the year 2015, students from Delhi ,Bihar, Punjab, AP, Rajasthan, Uttarakhand, Kerala, HP, Haryana were also admitted in the university. Besides J&K all India examination based admissions, has a fair amount of geographic diversity in student population.
- The review before the admission for the year 2015 led to devise various strategies for increasing the number of applicants so that meritorious students seek admission and add to the prestige of the University. The review further enabled to change timing and mode of admission i.e. the Central University of Jammu was the first in the region to start admission process. Moreover, the entire admission process was completed within the stipulated time period, prior to previous year where admission continued for 15 days. It is therefore pertinent to mention here that in the year 2014-15, 2666 candidates had applied as compared to 8775 candidates (2015-16) and 13,627 who opted for Central University of Jammu for the year 2016-2017. Moreover, students from various categories viz. SC, ST, OBC, Migrant, PWD have been admitted with a fair representation as per rules.
- The admission seekers were facilitated by providing them with an in-house banking counter from HDFC and other support facilities were also provided.

2.1.5 What are the strategies adopted to increase / improve access for students belonging to the following categories:

- SC/ST: Reservation of seats: SC-15%/ST-7.5%
- **OBC:** 27% seats reserved for OBC students
- Women: Separate hostel facility for women students
- **Persons with varied disabilities :**3%(HORIZONTAL) seats reserved for persons with varied disabilities
- **Economically weaker sections:** The University offers remedial classes to the students belonging to various categories to enhance/compensate for their academic losses. Admission is open to students of all categories (By having Reservation for Students in various categories).
- Outstanding achievers in sports and other extra curricular activities: The University is in the process of adopting a policy for promoting Outstanding achievers in sports as per UGC guidelines, in this context Udaan is one of such initiative for identifying the talent. However, the achiever at national and International level are being promoted. Similarly other co curricular activities are promoted for overall development of the students.

- 2.1.8 Were any programes discontinued/ staggered by the University in the last four years? If yes, please specify the reasons.
- Programmes which were launched by the University are running successfully till date.
- All courses like National Security Studies where no student, could be attracted in the first year received good response in the second year. It is a result of rigourous dissemination of information to the students. Integrated M.Sc. (Computer Science)-MCA Programme discontinued from Academic Session 2016-17 and replaced with M.Tech (Computer Science & Technology) Keeping in view the employability prospect of the Pass out.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

- 2.2.1 Does the University organize orientation / induction programme for freshers? If yes, give details such as the duration, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.
- The University organizes one day induction program for freshers of PG, Research and UG courses.
- Induction kits are provided to all the freshers.
- The students are also sensitized with the facilities available in the University like Library, Canteen, medical facilities, sports facilities, Transport, Scholarship, Incubation and Innovation Cell.
- They are given an idea about the variety of sports and cultural activities organized by the University.
- A video presentation is shown to students covering virtual tour of the upcoming campus at Bagla.
- Information pertaining to SPARSH, Anti-Ragging, Student conduct, Student Greivance Redrassal Mechanism, Gender Champions, Code of conduct, Hostel is also given to students
- At Departmental level, students are introduced with the faculty, senior students and staff. Besides, students are familiarized with the course structure and its scope. Placement procedure is also discussed.
- They are also made conscious about the class work activities which are in tune with calendar of activities circulated by the University.
- They are also shown the various facilities related to physical infrastructure.
- The students are also given an understanding about the feedback mechanism followed in the University.
- The student charter as per NAAC reflecting consciousness about the environment and respect to women is also made known to them.
- The students are explained about the library membership and evaluation pattern being followed in the entire semester.
- 2.2.2 Does the University have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of the student population" are analysed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?
- The feedback is received from alumni in its alumni association meet held annually regarding the different problems which they have been facing during their academic session.
- Such problems are then identified discussed, and appropriate remedial mechanisms like holding workshops, awareness programs, eminent lecture series, interaction with experts from industry—academia are adopted to address the issues.
- 2.2.3 Does the University offer bridge / remedial / add-on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

- The University has implemented orders issued by UGC for holding the remedial classes for the students who are slow learners or face some difficulty in keeping pace with other students.
- Majority of the departments hold remedial classes through tutorials and their issues are addressed from time to time.
- The students desirous of attending remedial classes are assisted by the teachers through notes, books, and references and at certain places through hands on experience in computer and other related skills.
- Faculty advisors/mentors have been nominated in each department to find out the problems of the students & accordingly remedial measures are planned.
- Under National Skill Qualification Framework(NSQF), the University is offering vocational courses in Retail/Tourism/Beauty & Wellness with multiple exit points.
- Additionally, the University has empanelled Adjunct / Visiting faculty from industry-academia for smooth conduct of programs under reference.

2.2.4 Has the University conducted any study on the academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically handicapped, slow learners, etc.? If yes, what are the main findings?

- The Progress of Students is review periodically by feedback mechanism.
- To review their progress their feedback is taken by the departmental representatives.
- As per the review and the progress in evaluation pattern, remedial measures are undertaken to fulfill the gaps if any.
- Some of the measure undertaken for disadvantaged communities include availability of application forms at subsidized rates and encouragement of student of apply for different governmental schemes for scholarship also Equal Opportunity Cell of the University helps the students in availing such facilities.

2.2.5 How does the University identify and respond to the learning needs of advanced learners?

- The University intends to collaborate with research institutions for responding to the learning needs of advanced learners. Seminars and educational workshops are also conducted by various Departments.
- The teachers always make an effort to identify the students who are meritorious and perform exceptionally well in the tests, seminars, presentations, etc.
- The process is channelized so that they feel attended and discussions may also be held with such students through tutorials.
- Personal attention is also given by the teachers to such students.
 Various co-curricular activities like personal discussion, debates, quizes, extempores are regularly organized.
- Mentors have been appointed to such students who pay personal attentions by understanding their specific needs.
- Student are advised to refer extra reading materials like E-books, E-Journals etc.
- Student are motivated to appear for public service commission examination and are motivated to pursue higher studies and research.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the University plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules (academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)?

The University plans teaching, learning and evaluating schedules in the following manner:

• All departments follow the Academic Calendar issued by the University. The Academic Calendar is

prepared by the committee of Deans, Academic Coordinator and administrative authorities based on guidelines of UGC. The syllabi of each course is also posted on the website.

- Each department prepares its own time-table before the commencement of the semester.
- Teaching plan of each subject is up-loaded for the information of the students. The teaching plan is prepared keeping in view the objectives of the course, time required in terms of number of lectures, tutorials and practicals to complete the content, transanctional strategy adopted to realise the objectives in the form of learning outcome and references related to the content to be taught. Quality of learning outcome of teaching and evaluation of students performance is a very important parameter for judging the academic environment of any institution.
- The University follows continuous evaluation system. Before the completion of each academic session, the department holds a meeting of all faculty members at the BOS /Departmental level discusses/reviews the courses offered to the students followed by updation in syllabi if needed and allots the courses to be taught in the next academic session by the respective faculty.
- In addition to this, students are exposed to other academic activities in which they are required to show their talent, ability through participation in presentations, seminars writing assignments, giving them the habit of raising questions and seeking clarifications etc.
- Every student in each Department is given opportunity to participate in wide variety of activities for a good exposure and likewise they are groomed to a wholesome personality.

2.3.2 Does the University provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

- The University provides course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session by displaying them on the University website. This makes the students well aware in advance about the courses in which they enroll, resulting in lesser students leaving the course in between and also gives the opportunity to the student to come prepared for the classes which makes the classroom discussions very rich, effective and interesting.
- In addition to course outlines and course schedules, the Head of the Department ensures the timely completion of the courses as per the Academic Calendar. The University strictly adheres to the Academic Calendar for its activities.
- The University has initiated feedback system both for the students and the faculty to ensure the effectiveness of the process.

2.3.3 Does the University face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the stipulated time frame and calendar? If yes, elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional measures to overcome these.

- The University completes the curriculum within the stipulated time frame and as per the Academic Calendar
- In case, a faculty requirement arises in the middle due to any unforseen reason or in the beginning of the session, the institution facilitates by inviting Guest faculty on Lecture basis or contractual faculty is appointed by conducting interviews before commencement of the session.

2.3.4 How is learning made student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contributes to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

• Learning is made student-centric through case based teachings, field trips and study tours, assignments that require information gathering from academic sources, seminars, presentations/animations and other ICT based aids.

- Participation of students in extra-curricular and extension activities is encouraged.
- Student community is encouraged to participate during lectures making it two way interaction programme. Students are encouraged to participate in seminars, open house discussions, class activities, quizzes, group-viva, class presentations, workshops, student teacher interaction etc.
- In addition to this, various departments of the University like EVS, HRM, MSCM, TTM, Economics, Education, Social Work etc. take the students for field trips to acquaint them with the practical knowledge, which again helps in providing first hand practical skill based learning.

2.3.5 What is University's policy on inviting experts/people of eminence to deliver lectures and/or organize seminars for students?

- The University has framed a policy wherein it invites eminent scholars under Eminent Lecture Series to deliver extension lectures pertaining to the development and awareness of the students on various areas.
- However, each department has an internal procedure wherein the experts are invited by the respective departments to deliver lectures and hold discussion in specific areas.

Policy: The University ensures that the invited person has attained eminence in the field. The eminent scholar can be from corporate sector as well. It is ensured that he/she should have contributed to the society.

2.3.6 Does the University formally encourage blended learning by using e-learning resources?

- The central library has subscribed online e-resources like UGC Info-Net, DELNET besides free access to online databases like emerald, sage, EBSCO etc.
- Moreover, students are encouraged to adopt the e-resources for enriching their presentations, group discussions, project work/dissertation etc.
- The University provides internet facility to all faculty members, scholars and students.
- The University has Five computer labs which provide free access to the students and faculty members

2.3.7 What are the technologies and facilities such as virtual laboratories, e-learning, open educational resources and mobile education used by the faculty for effective teaching?

- The University has subscribed access to online journals for the faculty and research scholars. In addition to this, the University also has NKN connectivity, Inflibnet, Video-conferencing facility, subscribed access to online books, wi-fi access to faculty, scholars and students on the campus.
- The University has also purchased software like SPSS, MATLAB and other data analysis softwares for improving the research acumen of the scholars and the faculty members
- Participation of the students in group discussion is held online though Webinar.

2.3.8 Is there any designated group among the faculty to monitor the trends and issues regarding developments in Open Source Community and integrate its benefits in the University's educational processes?

- The University has constituted a committee to monitor trends and issues regarding developments in Open Source Community and integrate its benefits in the University's educational processes.
- Besides this, various clubs have been formed at departmental level which help in all round development of the students by providing a platform for organizing multifaceted exercises and programmes.
- 2.3.9 What steps have the University/department taken to orient traditional classrooms into 24x7 learning places?
- The University has given Internet facility to its students doing research with 5 GB usage (extendable

upon request) for a month and unlimited access to faculty within the campus premises.

- Besides this, internet facility is also available to students in the computer lab till 5:30 pm, Library remains open till 8 pm in the evening within the premises of the University and also on holidays except Sundays.
- Moreover, the professional departments like TTM, HRM, MSCM etc. utilize the expertise of the faculty by engaging the students on weekends and organising online webinars, also by discussing case studies and organizing activities like role plays etc. for making classes a 24x7 learning place.
- The Friday club activity and seminars involves rigorous student preparation and interaction to strengthen their skills.
- Internet facility is provided in both boys and girls hostels for helping the students in their academic growth.

2.3.10 Is there a provision for the services of counselors/ mentors/advisors for each class or group students for academic, personal and psycho-social guidance? If yes, give details of the process and the number of students who have benefitted?

- At the onset of each semester, certain departments appoint one faculty as Class in-charge who acts as a counselor/mentor/advisor and handles their grievances and guides them accordingly. Also, SPARSH has designated nodal teachers for collaborating with the student representatives of each class. These nodal teachers act as counselors/mentors/advisors for academic, personal and psycho-social guidance.
- Moreover, each department has constituted a committee comprising of student and faculty members for implementing anti-ragging measures.
- However, in hostel premises 24 hr access to the Warden/Associate warden is available to the students for counseling/mentoring/advisory
- SPARSH Committee provides counselling services for both the campuses.

2.3.11 Were any innovative teaching approaches/methods/practices adopted/ put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve learning? What were the methods used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

- Faculty members from various Departments use different innovative teaching approaches to improve learning practices.
- Department of HRM & OB adopts case study method along with role plays, simulation and also organizes weekly management clubs which includes sales activity, presentation on contemporary topics, extempore and group discussions for holistic development and learning of the students.
- Various Remedial classes are also conducted to improve communication skill especially knowledge of English language is improved by organising remedial classes on regular basis for weak students. Market oriented assignments are undertaken to increase employability prospects.
- Case study practices are used to increase analytical power of students.
- There is no formal procedure adopted in evaluating the impact of small practices. But the performance of the students in the examination and increased participation in different activities show that students at large have been benefitted.
- The ICT technique assisted teaching tools such as Power Point Presentations, simulations, animations, audio-video presentations, you-tube, webinar supplemented by adequate learning resources and infrastructure are some of the innovative measures implemented by the University.

2.3.12 How does the University create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific

temper among the learners?

- The University organizes events like UDAAN to encourage the students to participate and exhibit their creative talent.
- University also encourages the students to participate by organizing debates, quizzes, workshops and thereby provides a platform to nurture their scientific temper.
- The University has created innovation, incubation and entrepreneurship council under which innovative club and university business incubation centre has been made functional from current academic session.
- So far, 16 innovators have been identified. The process for registration of Intellectual Property Rights have been initiated besides, innovators are asked to submit their detailed proposal in the prescribed format available on University website for nurturing of their ideas.

2.3.13 Does the University consider student projects mandatory in the learning programme? If yes, for how many programmes have they been (percentage of total) made mandatory?

- Number of projects executed within the University

- Role of faculty in facilitating such projects:
- At PG level, students are required to submit project report/dissertation as a part of their degree programme by most of the departments in the School of humanities& Social Science, Educational studies, Business studies, Basic and Applied Sciences, Languages, Life sciences etc.
- Number of the students doing in-house and external projects varies from department to department. As project is a mandatory requirement for various programmes. All Departments give project work to the students under mentorship. The number of projects completed in one academic session for a few Departments can be listed as follows:
- Computer Science and Information Technology -165; HRM & OB: 50
- Environmental Studies: 145; Languages: 60; Life Sciences 09; Mathematics: 28, Social Sciences: 100.

2.3.14 Does the University/department have a well qualified pool of human resource to meet the requirements of the curriculum? If there is a shortfall, how is it supplemented?

• The University has the well qualified pool of HR in the form of permanent faculty / faculty on deputation. In case of short fall, contractual appointments through selection committee are made and in severe cases guest faculty are also invited to overcome shortfall.

2.3.15 How are the faculty enabled to prepare computer-aided teaching/learning materials? What are the facilities available in the University for such efforts?

- The University has provided laptop to all faculty members.
- Access to e-journals, e-books, NKN connectivity has been enabled for the faculty members. In addition to this, departments are also providing smart board facility for effective teaching.
- The University at regular intervals organizes ICT related workshops to update its faculty regarding latest software's.

2.3.16 Does the University/department have a mechanism for the evaluation of teachers by the students /alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation feedback used to improve the quality of the teaching-learning

• The University has recently evolved a structured mechanism for seeking feedback from the student community.

• A feedback questionnaire is prepared which is distributed to the students at the end of the semester for getting their opinion about the quality of teaching and teaching methodologies.

The feedback is then analyzed and attempts are made to overcome the shortfalls. The same data is used by IQAC for conducting further research for improving the quality under the quality radar mechanism.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 How does the University/department plan and manage its human resources to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum?

- Competent and specialized faculty has been recruited to meet requirements of the curriculum. In case of shortfall, the University appoints contractual/Adjunct Faculity as well as guest faculty.
- At the same time in order to meet changing requirements of the curriculum, all departments conduct Board of Studies meeting to revise the existing curriculum in order to meet the advancement of knowledge in respective disciplines. Periodic curriculum update is done by respective faculty in each discipline.
- The University ensures that its faculty attends refresher/orientation courses/seminars/workshops from time to time in order to enhance their teaching skills.
- Provision for study leave and leave for academic pursuit is also offered.
- Provisions for financial assistance is granted for attending conferences at National/International level as per UGC norms.

- Yes, University has empaneled eminent professors as adjunct (8) and visiting faculty (6) catering to the needs of different departments besides university inviting experts from industry and academia on periodic basis for interaction with students and faculty.

- Non teaching staff is provided with in-house training to enhance their skills related to financial and administrative matters. They are also facilitated to have personal growth by pursuing their higher education in various universities across the country with paid leave facility.

- Faculty members of the University visit other universities at regular intervals to deliver lecture as resource persons. - The University ordinances are available on University website, which gives complete information on the evaluative process.
- The syllabus and scheme consisting of details of evaluation process of each programme is displayed on the University website so that the students, teachers and all other stakeholders can easily access the required information.

- Since its inception, the CUJ has adopted, Comprehensive Continuous Internal Assessment evaluation process and the same is being followed in letter and spirit.
- Examination forms have been made available on the university website besides examination fee has been integrated with regular fee.
- The Departments show evaluated answer copies of tests as well as semester exams to the students. They can compare their answers with other students and see the best answers.
- The performance of the students in the mid-semester help the students to improve their performance in end semester examination.
- 50% of the question papers are set and evaluated by external examiners. The external examiners are invited at the University for evaluating the scripts and the same are than shown to the students by the external evaluators. The external examiners discuss the evaluated scripts with the students.

- The student is given the right to discuss with the evaluator and get satisfied with awarded marks. The entire process is completely transparent.
- The student can appeal to Board at the end of Semester examination, if he/she remains dissatisfied.
- Ordinances, notices, examination schedules, academic calendars and results for all the courses are hosted on the University website for all the stakeholders for each course

- The average time taken to declare the result after examination is less than 10 days.
- Hard copies of result notifications are supplied to the respective Departments for display on Notice Board for intimation to candidates.

- The University ensures transparency in the evaluation process.
- Each student is shown answer sheets after evaluation by the Faculty and marks are reviewed.
- Students are briefed about the criteria of assessment and the mistake they have committed in answering the questions making this process open to scrutiny.
- Confidentiality is achieved by setting multiple copies of the question paper. The photocopied set of papers are put in a sealed and signed envelope by the paper setter himself. Full confidentiality and secrecy is ensured with reference to examination.
- Centre wise set of sealed question papers are prepared for delivery to respective centre.

2.5.5 Does the University have an integrated examination platform for the following processes?

Pre-examination processes \pm Time table generation, OMR, student list generation, invigilator, squads, attendance sheet, online payment gateway, etc.

- Time table is prepared every semester according to the Academic Calendar.
- The data relating to the number of students enrolled department wise is sent to the office of Controller of Examinations through R/R.
- The students are counted paper wise for each course.
- The eligibility of the students is determined for appearing in the end semester examination after getting record of attendance and passing in internal & mid semester examinations.
- The admit cards and Roll No. Slips are prepared and sent to the Departments for eligible students.
- Question papers are set as per approved syllabi, printed and sealed with complete confidentiality.
- Exercise relating to appointment of invigilators and generation of attendance sheets is undertaken by the concerned Department.

Examination process ± Examination material management, logistics, etc.

- Examination material management, logistics etc. is taken care by the examination branch.
- The demand for logistics is placed before the concerned authority well in advance so as to avoid any logistic issue before or during exams.

Post-examination process \pm Attendance capture, OMR-based exam result, auto processing, generic result processing, certification, etc.

• Students are required to mark their attendance during each examination and the attendance sheets are submitted by the superintendent to the Head of the Department.

- A software titled CBCS has been prepared to ensure recording of marks in the award rolls in digital form so that the mark sheets and the result register may be generated using digitalized data.
- This process facilitates preservation of data in digitalized format for future reference and record purposes.

2.5.6 Has the University introduced any reforms in its Ph.D. evaluation process?

- The admission to M.Phil-Ph.D Integrated Programme / Ph.D. programme is made through CUCET (entrance test).
- No. of vacancies per department is notified before admission.
- The course work is a compulsory requirement in each course.
- Plagiarism check is mandatory for Ph.D thesis.
- Pre-submission seminars is a compulsory requirements.
- The University follows the UGC (Minimum Standards and Procedure for the Award of M.Phil/Ph.D degrees resolution, 2016) regulations in relation to Ph.D. .

No regular college exists as on date.

2.5.8 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to examinations?

- Grievances related to Evaluation and examinations are resolved at the departmental level itself.
- The student can discuss and seek clarifications with the evaluator at the time of seeing the answer sheets. If not satisfied by the evaluator, the student may represent his case to head of the department, which will be considered by a committee consisting of Dean of the school, Head of the department and teacher concerned. Decision of the committee is considered as final.
- Grievances related to Examination Processes like issue of admit card, correction in marks sheet, issue of degree are resolved by the appropriate authorities associated with the examinations.

2.5.9 What efforts have been made by the University to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations? Mention any significant efforts which have improved the process and functioning of the examination division/section.

- Examination branch has endeavoured to assist University Departments by providing a software titled CBCS to ensure recording of marks in the award rolls in digital form.
- This process facilitates preservation of data in digitalized format for future reference and record purposes.
- M.Phil thesis, their titles/topics and supervisors allotted to the candidates are approved by Concerned Board of Studies and School Board.
- The office of the controller of examination ensures that the submitted thesis is in accordance with approved titles/topics and under authorized supervisor.
- Further, the examination branch in consultation with various departments issues advisories and seeks feedback for effective functioning from teachers, scholars, alumni and final year outgoing students.

- The curriculum of Post Graduate, Post Graduate Diploma and Certificate courses of University are prepared in accordance with norms of UGC and other regulatory bodies such as NCTE, AICTE, etc. to meet the academic standard.
- The content of syllabi is strictly implemented to facilitate the students in acquiring knowledge and skills in their respective subjects by employing recent technologies.
- The PG and Diploma students are provided in-house projects/training/field work to update with the advanced knowledge and skills. They are prepared to participate in group discussions and seminars; provided individual training that induces innovative ideas and enhances their communicative skills and also imparts good work culture and ethical values.
- The University encourages the students to participate in the celebration of National festivals; observation of national science day, and quiz competition on various subjects.
- Student's Welfare Unit and NSS Units of the University undertake various cultural, social and environmental related activities through student participation to expose them to local, national, traditional, social and cultural activities which build a leadership quality, sense of national integrity and induce to take social, ethical, cultural and environmental responsibilities.
- The University provides free space for thinking independently and ignite the minds of students to face new challenges.
- Departmental platforms in terms of Associations and Clubs are formed that cater to the development of the following: a) Team Leadership behaviour b) Communication, soft skills and personality development c) Social sensitivity and community services d) Development of civic and aesthetic sense

- All the departments of the University have clearly stated the objectives of each course it offers.
- Since these objectives have been set by the teachers and approved by Boards of Studies so the teachers are already aware of these and each student is given a copy of the course curriculum which is extensively discussed in the introductory classes.

- The teaching learning process is not only theoretical but also blends with classroom assignments, departmental workshops and presentations for student participation. There are separate practical classes and remedial classes to meet the intended learning outcomes.
- Students have rich library as well as computer and internet facilities. The students can also access the online library and e-resources.
- The Departments follow continuous internal evaluation process which include submission of assignments, seminars and presentations.
- In addition to this, course curriculum are updated periodically in line with the changing requirements of the industries so as to increase employability of the students.

- The process of getting students feedback has been initiated recently.
- The students were given feedback forms which once filled were collected and evaluated by the parent departments. Likewise, necessary action has been taken as desired and required in the interest of the students.

- The University facilitates computer aided teaching, projectors, video-conferencing equipments, smart boards etc like facilities for departments.
- New softwares are procured for learning and evaluation purposes. Any particular software or hardware required by any department for teaching can be procured. In addition to this, classes are equipped with smart boards and modern teaching aids for teaching purposes.

- The Central University of Jammu has Board of Studies from each Department and School Board for each school which function as research committees to monitor and address issues related to research. The composition of research committees includes Dean, Head of Departments, External Experts and faculty members. The external members who are experts of their respective disciplines are involved in Board of Studies of the Department and School Board. The external members are also involved in evaluating minor research projects by circulation.
- The Central Research committee has been constituted with a mandate to facilitate and monitor all research related activities.

The committee follows the guidelines as under:

The committee has recommended compulsory plagiarism check of Ph. D thesis through the software provided by INFLIBNET to ensure genuinity of research work. The committee has recommended uniform pattern of enrolment through entrance test, followed by interview with a defined weightage. To enhance the quality of research, the committee has laid the following benchmarks:

- The publication shall be screened for selecting the best publication for granting award.
- The research projects will be solicited from faculty for financial assistance by the University (inhouse).
- Proposes to carry joint research projects with Central University of Kashmir and Central University of Himachal Pradesh.
- Organize Workshops in selected area of research.
- Faculty members have been advised to publish two papers in a year in reputed journal. Various recommendations pertaining to the proposals submitted for undergoing research have been implemented by the Departments. As these implementations are recent in nature, their impacts needs to be assessed after a certain gap of time.

3.1.2 What is the policy of the university to promote research in its affiliated/constituent colleges?

• The university has only one community college running course of 1 year of Beauty and Wellness. Since this is only of one year duration for diploma course after 10+2, so the scope of research is not available. The university by now does not have any other affiliated/constituent college.

3.1.3 What are the proactive mechanisms adopted by the university to facilitate the smooth implementation of research schemes/ projects?

- advancing funds for sanctioned projects providing space, furniture
- providing seed money
- simplification of procedures related to sanctions / purchases to be made by the investigators
- autonomy to the principal investigator/coordinator for utilizing overhead charges
- timely release of grants
- timely auditing
- Timely submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities
- A committee has been constituted for mobilizing resources from different government bodies. Apart from this, as and when information is received from the funding agencies, the same is disseminated to all the faculties through the Head of the Department.
- The finance committee periodically audits the account statements of the University besides CAAG audits. Apart from these, the finances utilised by the University under different heads are reported to different authorities of the University which includes the Academic Council, Executive Council and University Court.
- The University follows a policy of promoting the teaching staff to apply for projects from various national and international funding agencies like UGC, ICSSR, DST, World Bank, etc. The university has nominated academic coordinator to look after the proposals and same are submitted to experts for evaluation.
- Regarding seed money, University allocates the requisite seed money/start up grant for research related initiatives in the start of career in the institution after proper approval from the concerned committees.
- Regarding the simplification of the procedures, there is a purchase policy of the University which follows the provisions as outlined in relevant ordinance.
- The Vice-Chancellor has constituted the non-statutory advisory board in sciences and advisory research board for handling all matters related to the implementation of choice based credit system, inter-institutional credit transfer arrangements and course equivalence.
- The advisory research board will expedite and increase the faculty for writing projects which they can then send to funding agency at the national level for the financial support.

- If a faculty is invited for any such research initiative or collaboration outside they are facilitated through simple process for availing grants from various national funding agencies.

In order to sensitize its faculty and students on its institutional Social Responsibilities, plenary talks are organized which acts as discussion forums. Faculty and Students are being encouraged to gradually

The University has set up a UBA Cell to work in collaboration with District administration, State government departments, and the village community. A participatory and people centred approach is being adopted to assess the developmental issues in the adopted Jhang panchayat under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan.
- The Central University of Jammu has been functioning with a vision to act as a nodal agency by playing a participatory role in the affairs of the people of surrounding areas in particular and civil society in general. In this regard, the Central University of Jammu has decided to adopt the two schools with a purpose to strengthen them in domains of infrastructure, academics, co-curricular activities and professional competencies of the teachers and administrators. In this direction, a visit was made by Dr. J.N. Baliya from the Department of Educational Studies, CUJ and Mr. Bhagat, Chief Education Officer (Samba) in the above said schools on 14-10-2015 to decide further modalities. After the exhaustive discussions with the principals and the staff members of the schools visited, a comprehensive need assessment emerged out regarding various activities and programmes which may be undertaken by the University under the "Scheme of Establishment of Model Schools in the State of J&K". State level conference with UNICEF has been organized along with the workshop on disaster preparedness. The department has signed MoU with CBR network for instituting online course on disability studies.

Outreach initiative has been taken by the University. The University is in the process of establishing Community Development Cell. Under the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, the village Bagla, Raya Suchani has been adopted for its up-liftment by the Department of Social Work. The University has adopted four villages.

- The University Business Incubation Centre has been established which promotes the innovative ideas of the entrepreneurs from the society and incubates the same.
- As an outreach activity, the students and faculty offer consultation to the beneficiaries where our students are placed for concurrent field work vis-a-vis government organization / non-government organizations / open communities. Also the students from Department of HRM & OB undergo projects with various industries. The Department of Economics carries out research projects on socio-economic issues of the neighbouring areas.

NSS has recently been established by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports, Govt. of India. NSS at CUJ is actively involved in the extension activities by organizing field trips and student development activities. The NSS cell has organised a blood donation camp in which faculty and students have actively participated. The NSS has also taken up Swach Bharat Programme for maintaining clean and green campus.

Department of Social Work in collaboration with government organizations, non-government organizations and community at large provides services for empowering the underprivileged and the most vulnerable sections of the society. Department of HRM and OB conducts a feasibility study for starting new ventures and investment options for the existing and new generation entrepreneurs. The Department of TTM is actively engaged in promoting and exploring tourism entrepreneurship and tourism avenues in the state by collaborating with various state and National and International bodies.

The Department of Tourism and Travel Management makes arrangements for the summer training for the second semester students in Industry and On-the-Job training for the fourth semester students in the entire term of the semester. These industrial exposures planned are with the vision to inculcate the required job skills and smart human being in the actual work environment. The personal achievements of the students are evaluated on the basis of the viva-voce conducted for summer training report and

also a dissertation is submitted by the student of fourth semester. In addition, the Departments of MBA (Tourism and Travel) and MBA (HRM & OB) conduct workshops on developing the soft skills of the students which are culminated with the mock interviews for the students. The Department of Social Work does not have a formal procedure to track the involvement of students in social movements, however the students are encouraged to render voice to the unheard sections of the society. They are also encouraged to perform citizenship roles by understanding and performing the duties of a responsible citizen. The University has adopted five villages along with two schools and one Panchyat which would ensure social justice and empower the under privileged section from the society.

3.6.6 Bearing in mind the objectives and expected outcomes of the extension activities organized by the university, how did they complement students' academic learning experience? Specify the values inculcated and skills learnt.

The extension activities help the students to keep liaison with the community by understanding societal realities. Skills in social interaction have improved significantly since the University came into being. The students have developed their academic, research and social and professional acumen which helps them in seeking placements in reputed institutions. Department of Tourism and Travel Management has a record of 100% placement. Department of HRM & OB has provided the students with paid internship to all the students besides appropriate placements depending on their capabilities.

The University ensures the involvement of the community through its outreach activities. The trained faculty members give requisite time for such activities and the University compensates the time by monetary rewards. The Department holds meeting with DC and adopted Panchyat for creating awareness among the Community members. 4.1 Physical Facilities

The Central University of Jammu is presently working from the Temporary Academic Block at Sainik Colony, Jammu. Recently the University has shifted its Administrative Office to the permanent campus situated at Bagla village. The Central University of Jammu has taken adequate steps to ensure that the growth of the infrastructure at the new campus is able to cater to the growing needs of the institution. The requirements relating to infrastructure obtained from Departments of Studies/ Offices etc. are scrutinized by approved proposal, the grant is being utilized as per the requirements prioritized for the creation at the new campus and augmentation of physical infrastructure at the temporary academic block. Efforts are made to ensure the quality and optimum utilization of infrastructure created. From planning to deliverance, the process is structured, made transparent and has participation of stakeholders. The interim proposals are prepared for upgrading the infrastructure at the Temporary Academic Block on need basis. The supportive facilities on the campus are developed to contribute to the effective ambience for curricular, extra-curricular and administrative activities. In response to the provisions under section 46 of the Disabilities Act, 1995 - Non discrimination in the built environment, it has been envisaged to develop Central University of Jammu into most modern, vibrant and Green Campus conforming to GRIHA Five Star Rating.

The Architects M/s SIKKA Associates, the architect of the Central University of Jammu has been requested to incorporate the requisite features of ramps, adaptation of toilets for wheel chair users, Braille symbols and auditory signals in elevators or lifts are in the buildings under execution to provide barrier free access to the persons with disabilities (PwDs).

Accordingly, in the main building of Directorate of Distance Education which has been recently inaugurated in the University Campus Bagla all the provisions of the act viz. approach ramp to the building with tactile flooring and lifts for the vertical movement of users with features of auditory signage's and separate toilets with adaptation for the wheel chair users have been provided for the users

so as to provide Barrier Free Environment.



In addition to above, advisory services are provided to the staff to the users from time to time.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1 Does the university have a comprehensive IT policy with regard to listed parameters such as IT Service Management, Information Security, Network Security, Risk Management, Software Asset Management, Open Source resources.

The University has comprehensive, well defined and declared IT policy with regard to listed parameters such as IT Service Management, Information Security, Network Security, Risk Management, Software Asset Management, Open Source resources and Green Computing, to a fair degree, all these parameters are in practice. The University has a Central Computer Lab for catering to the needs of all the stakeholders. The services offered include IT infrastructure, services, software systems and other resources etc. Besides the Computer Laboratory Department of Computer Science, collaborates on policy matters and guidelines provided by CU Jammu, UGC and other departments under various Ministries of Govt. of India on the following:

IT Service Management: The policy for implementation, improvement and management of information technology services at CU Jammu focuses upon providing a framework to structure IT services wherein the University manages the infrastructure, updation and its maintenance. Also university provides services of IT technical personnel so that quality of the IT services and products are delivered according to their needs which also change with time. The Information Technology Infrastructure is the guiding tool for the IT Technical Personnel. The framework referred to above encompasses set of rules, procedures, event and non-event driven processes, inventory, documentation, logs of events, skilled and trained human-ware, tools and techniques etc., to meet the set goals.

Information Security: CU Jammu has the policy of defending information from unauthorized access, use, disclosure, disruption, modification, perusal, inspection, recording or destruction. Implementation of identification, authentication and authorization mechanisms, enforcement of guidelines to users, Setting up of personal firewall rules, hardening of computing devices for security, provisioning of gateway level security, limiting open ports, monitoring of logs, backup of data, etc., are some of the processes which help in achieving information security.

Network Security: To mitigate many network security threats today that are spread over the Internet like, Viruses, worms, and Trojan horses, Spyware, malware and adware, hacker attacks, Denial of service attacks, Data interception and theft, Identity theft, etc., CU Jammu has the policy for network security. Apart from physical security of the network, other security components deployed are: (i) Firewalls, (ii) Anti-virus and Antispyware, (iii) Bandwidth management and control to provide secure remote access.

Software Asset Management: For managing and optimizing purchase, deployment, maintenance, utilization and disposal of software applications and software systems within CUJ, the model is followed which consists of the basic steps: (i) Inventory of software assets is maintained, (ii) Software licenses and documentation are organized.

A dedicated ICT unit having most of the latest IT facilities like high speed printing, good quality printing, fast scanning, internet, wi-fi, photocopier, colour photocopier - MFF, are provided as a common facility at Bagla campus.

4.3.3 What are the institutional plans and strategies for deploying and upgrading the IT infrastructure and associated facilities?

For deploying and upgrading the IT Infrastructure and associated facilities the major strategy adopted by the University is to achieve the goals through the funding from 5 year Plan and UGC Projects etc. and also internal savings of the University under approvals from UGC. For example, the University after its establishment has created a full fledged operational Central Computer Laboratory along with the computer facilities for research scholars. Also the university is working on the development of LAN network through Fibre Optic Backbone. Complete WI-FI enabled campus and hostels submitted to MHRD in association with ERNET, India. Amount of Rs. 4.46 cr has already been sanctioned in this regard.

4.3.4. Give details on access to on-line teaching and learning resources and other knowledge and information database/packages

Library provides the facility of on-line journals through UGC-INFLIBNET, Web page, OPAC access of, e-books, e-journals and other electronic databases j-gate, Science Finder/Science Direct, Inter-library loan facility provide to the user community through DELNET etc. Access to on-line teaching and learning resources by staff and students for quality teaching, research and learning is through e-Journals. This facility is subscribed through INFLIBNET. Technological up gradation is done to provide remote access of the library to faculty, research scholars and student for quality teaching, learning and research.

4.3.5 What are the new technologies deployed by the university in enhancing student learning and evaluation during the last four years and how do they meet new/future challenges?

For enhancing learning experience by the students, the University provides Wifi enabled Temporary Academic Block. Also the university has provided the internet facilities at Hostels for the benefit of the students and research scholars.

The University during last four years has taken number of technological enhancement and up-gradation steps as described below:

- 1. Proposal for establishment of Language Labs has been submitted by the University
- 2. Up-gradation of various computer laboratories across the campus has taken place by adopting latest hardware and software systems with capacity enhancement objects.
- 3. The Internet speed has been upgraded from 44 Mbps to 1Gbps. The bandwidth utilization has increased 10 folds and is likely to saturate as soon as networking projects in hand gets completed.
- 4. The video conferencing facilities has been established as central pool facility for all the departments
- 5. The University also conducts seminars and workshops for various stakeholders.

4.3.6 What are the IT facilities available to individual teachers for effective teaching and quality research?

A large number of teachers are equipped with a laptop, printer, scanner and Internet connection via campus LAN. Access to network based SPSS and other specialized software are available to such teachers and scholars.

4.3.5 Give details of ICT-enabled classrooms/learning spaces available within the university? How are they utilized for enhancing the quality of teaching and learning?

The University is in the process of transforming traditional green/white board based teaching methodology to ICT enabled smart class-rooms. Already few departments are well equipped with the smart class rooms. All the departments have WiFi facilities along with projector. All the teachers are well trained for utilizing the IT enabled infrastructure.

4.3.6 How are the faculty assisted in preparing computer- aided teaching-learning materials? What are the facilities available in the university for such initiatives?

As per guidelines of UGC, the University Computer Department as well as other departments organizes short term and extensive training programs for teachers, research scholars and other category of staff in the University. These training programs are conducted mainly on Windows Operating Systems, Microsoft Office. The other training programs are also organized on SPSS, Anti-plagiarism tools, Java, oracle, hardware, networking etc. The university deputes its faculty members for participating in the Orientation and Refresher programmes along with various seminars and workshops time and again. Such programs, in turn help the teachers for carrying out their teaching practices.

4.3.7 How are the computers and their accessories maintained?

Computers and related peripherals are generally purchased under a minimum of 3 years on-site comprehensive warranty. The supplier firm is entrusted the task of providing on-site comprehensive support by the AMC. The in-charge coordinate with the supplier firm for fixing any hardware and software issues until the expiry of the warranty. After the expiry of warranty, financial implications are met with the internal resources of the university. All these operations are done under the IT services Management framework as defined under 4.3.1.

4.3.8 Does the university avail of the National Knowledge Network connectivity? If so, what are the services availed of?

The University has 1Gbps connectivity from National Knowledge Network (NKN). The services availed of are: e-Journals Facility, Academic resources on the Internet, video conferencing etc.

4.3.9 Does the university avail of web resources such as Wikipedia, dictionary and other education enhancing resources? What are its policies in this regard?

The University has a liberal policy for access of web resources like Wikipedia and other knowledge enhancing resources.

For major upgrades and deployment of services, the Computer Laboratory and other Departments of the University largely depend upon allocations under 5 year plan and University's own internal savings.

The University has got a full-fledged University Building Department which comprises a Executive Engineer, Assistant Engineers and Junior Engineers with supporting staff to look after the construction and maintenance of the University buildings, roads, water supply lines, sewer lines etc. in the upcoming campus and at Temporary Academic Block. The infrastructure like buildings, roads, sewer lines, water supply lines, electric lines, electrification and other important services for the University campus are being created at the upcoming campus by the dedicated staff or the Building Department and Electricity Department.

4.4.2 How are the infrastructure facilities, services and equipments maintained? Give details.

The University has huge infrastructure facilities in terms of buildings of academic departments & non-academic departments, hostel buildings besides having a vast road and electricity network in its upcoming campus. It also has massive sport facilities as well as IT related infrastructure. The system of maintenance of infrastructure and services on the campus will be decentralized. The day to day maintenance and repair of buildings and roads is the responsibility of the University Building Department headed by an Executive Engineer and a team of Engineers and other technical staff like Mason, Plumber and Electrician etc. To look after the maintenance and ensure uninterrupted power supply, the university has engaged the technical staff.

The University has a Health Office that functions under the administrative control of the University Health Officer and cater to the needs of different stakeholders.

The University ensures uninterrupted connectivity of internal telephones whereas maintenance of IT related infrastructure is being looked after by the Computer Department.

In addition to the above, the following are also important:

- Budgetary allocations are made every year for the maintenance of the infrastructure and equipments.
- Annual Maintenance Contract (AMC) with reputable firms is put in place in accordance to GFR for proper and timely maintenance of the equipments.
- The University Building Department looks after the other infrastructure maintenance as per budgetary allocation.
- Depreciation at fixed rates is also charged out of fixed assets.

CRITERION V

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

5.1.1 Does the University have a system for student support and mentoring? If yes, what are its structural and functional characteristics?

Yes, the University has a system for student support and mentoring. The main characteristics are as follows:

- The University provides individual and group conference for the students along with field visits where their learning in the field is mentored by faculty. Also, a detailed report of the activities undertaken in the field is formulated.
- Regular activities like Dissertation, Group activities, soft skills enhancement programs, tutorials have been initiated in the departments as a regular feature to groom students' professional skills.
- The University has student grievance redressal mechanism which gives students' essential support to resolve their issues which are academic as well as non-academic in nature. The university maintains the appropriate teacher student ratio which helps in giving proper counselling and mentoring to the students.
- SPARSH i.e Sensitization, Prevention and Redressal of Sexual Harassment under which University has constituted a University Complaints Committee (UCC) to addresses the issues and complaints filed by the students or employees of the University.
- The faculty members provide individual supervision to students and help them in acquiring skills for applying the theoretical aspects of the profession in their field practice.

5.1.2 Apart from classroom interaction, what are the provisions available for academic mentoring?

The students are guided for their field work by the faculty and they are also supervised in the field work settings by the professional equipped with qualification/experience in professional work. A few examples are as follows:

- The Department of NSS initiated some innovative programmes like group project for the students. For example, a project named "Glance of South Asia" has been given to the students and they have to cover all the countries of South Asia and also they have to talk about all the aspects like Demography, Socioeconomic, Political, Strategic etc..
- The Department of English has initiated a Forum named "Illuminati" and till date 3 sessions have been conducted. The forum takes up academic texts conjoined with participants' experiences to facilitate, sensitize and provide them understanding of the emerging knowledge in the field. Illuminati organizes seminars, talks and discussions on burning issues. The department also provides e-books and materials to the students. Events like literary quizzes titles "Lit-Wit Quiz" is also organized by the Department for the students.
- Various departments in the University maintain different student clubs which primarily focuses on students' communication skills, debates etc. and give the students a chance to take feedback from the faculty.
- Apart from classroom interactions, the students go for field works on themes like eco-tourism, bird watching etc. The students of Department of Tourism and Travel Management also participate in National Events like Great India Tourism Bazar organized by FICCI.
- Summer training, field trips, quizzes and many other student driven activities are taken up by institution. The initiative of "Friday Club" by the Department of HRM and OB embibes entrepreneurial skills among the students.
- Department of Economics organizes "Friday Seminar" in order to update students about the events that occur in the country or around the world.
- Remedial classes are held for slow learners.

- Regular academic progress is checked through the participation of students in various activities
- Pre-placement training is provided. These training programmes caters to needs of students as regards to their identification, and career prospects.

5.1.3 Does the university have any (personal enhancement and development schemes such as career counselling, soft skill development, career-path-identification, and orientation to well-being for its students)? Give details of such schemes.

Yes, the University has personal enhancement and development schemes such as career couselling, soft skill development, career-path-identification for the well being of the students. The details are as follow:

- Induction- Students are guided on developing skills necessary for social work practitioners and also provided career guidance.
- Curriculum Design- the course is designed in such a way which can cater to the practice/employment needs of the student.
- The University conducts on regular basis various workshops on career counselling, soft skill development, career-path-identification etc. The experts from the industry as well as academia are invited to conduct such workshops.
- Students are counselled at regular intervals regarding career opportunities as well as the choice of courses to opt for within and outside the department.
- The objective of the Central Placement cell of the university is to get students placed in reputed companies, Government Organisations and the Private Sector.
- Soft Skill- Workshops are being conducted at regular intervals by the university for the students for their skill development. The Department of Tourism and Travel Management has started soft skill development programme for its students where experts are called from the industry to guide the students on improving their interview skills, communication skills etc. The Department of Educational studies offers a core course as "Personality Development and Soft Skills" for the students.
- The Department of Mass Communication and New Media has organised remedial classes for improving English language of the students, which is essential for their personality development. Also presentations, group discussions, extempore are organised in the department to orient the students for personality enhancement.
- Students exhibit their abilities in dance, drama, music, fine arts and library activities etc through cultural activities organised by the university

5.1.4 Does the university provide assistance to students for obtaining educational loan from banks and other financial institutions?

Guidance is provided to the students about availing benefits of the welfare schemes provided by the government for educational advancement. So far institution has forwarded two applications for obtaining educational loan. In case, any student needs financial assistance then the University invites banks for interaction with students. The banks otherwise, make presentation about the facilities and schemes available with them. SBI and HDFC bank have already made such presentations which was appreciated by one and all.

5.1.5 Does the university publish its updated prospectus and handbook annually? If yes, what are the main issues / activities / information included / provided to students through these documents? Is there a provision for online access?

Yes, Annual Prospectus is regularly published at the time of admission. It is also posted on website for

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wider information about the entire university. The applicants or the students have free online access to these documents. In addition to this, the University also publishes a quarterly newsletter "Campus Update" having all academic and non-academic details of the campus. The Department of Tourism and Travel Management has launched their own newsletter on 20th February, 2015 which is managed by the students of the department.

The University has instituted a scholarship of Rs 10000for awarding 1st rank holder in each Department from the session 2014-15. The M.Phil scholars are paid Rs 5000/- and Ph.D scholars are paid Rs 8000/- per month on the basis of their attendance and progress report of supervisor/HOD besides annual contingency grant. The JRF students in different departments are also receiving scholarships/fellowships

5.1.7 What percentage of students receive financial assistance from state government, central government and other national agencies (Kishore Vaigyanik Protsahan Yojana (KVPY), SN Bose Fellow, etc.)?

One student from the Department of Social Work and Sociology has availed the benefit of financial assistance provided by Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, GOI.

In the Department of Mathematics about 22.5% Students received financial assistance from State, Central Govt. & other national agencies. All the students belonging to reserved category received assistance from Social Welfare Department of the State. Two students from the Department of English are availing Centrally funded Rajiv Gandhi fellowship.

5.1.8 Does the university have an International Student Cell to attract foreign students and cater to their needs?

In order to attract foreign students, an International Student Cell has been established by the University and communication in this regard has been provided to different Embassies. The University is in the process of attracting overseas students from next academic session.

5.1.9 Does the university provide assistance to students for obtaining educational loan from banks and other financial institutions?

The University disseminates the information related to educational loans among students through circulars and also by placing the information on notice board of every Department. In case any student approaches, appropriate bonafide certificate is provided by the institution covering his/her details required for availing this facility. So far university has forwarded 2 applications for educational loan. In addition, awareness is created among students by the banks, HDFC and SBI have already appraised the students about the facility and services they are rendering in this regard.

5.1.10 What types of support services are available for

* Overseas students

Currently no overseas student has been registered with the University

* physically challenged / differently-abled students

- For admissions, 3% seats have been reserved for physically challenged students.
- Infrastructure wise: Ramps, Tactile flooring, wash rooms etc. have been constructed in the main campus at Bagla to facilitate the physically challenged/ differently-abled students etc. A provision of Ramp in TAB has been created to facilitate the movement of physically challenged students.
- In the upcoming campus of the University, care is being taken for providing facilities for PWD students and facilities are being created according to PWD Act of GoI.
- Awareness Programmes by Equal Opportunity Cell are being organised from time to time to sensitise University fraternity towards these issues.

* SC/ST, OBC and economically weaker sections

Equal Opportunity Cell of the University is mandated to initiate and ensure implementation of policies, schemes and programmes for the inclusion of disadvantaged group within the framework of policies and guidelines of UGC/ Government/University. The University ensures that every person is provided with an equal opportunity at all levels irrespective of any caste, religion, race, creed, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, marital status, age, minorities, economically weaker section or disability. Various scholarships offered by UGC to such students such as, Rajiv Gandhi National Fellowship for SC/ST candidates, Post Graduate scholarship for Professional courses, Post Doctoral fellowship etc. is being promoted by the University for these students. Total Number of students availing Rajiv Gandhi National fellowship are 2 from Department of English

* students participating in various competitions/conferences in India and abroad

The faculty of various Departments encourage students to participate in various conferences and sometimes teachers also go along with them. Students attended "MELA" in Chandigarh i.e Multi Ethnic Literature Association. The students of HRM & OB have participated in various competitions, won prizes and brought laurels to the University. Similarly, students of TTM have also participated in various workshops, seminars and competitions at local and national level. The University is providing financial support to the students to attend seminars and conferences within India and abroad in the form of travel grant. In case of faculty, University has assigned grant of 10,000 twice a year to each faculty for attending national conferences. Besides, university has earmarked budget for faculty members for attending international conferences as per UGC guidelines. Two students attended Saksham Bharat programme and interacted with Minister for HRD, GOI on forthcoming new policy on education. The expenditure for to and fro was given by the university.

* health centre, health insurance etc.

- Health Centre with qualified Doctors and Medical Attendant is available during University timings and facility is available on call 24x7.
- Accidental Medical Insurance (Accidental) upto 50000/- is available for students of the University.
- Ambulance facilities available for any emergency

*skill development (spoken English, computer literacy, etc.)

Various Departments have taken initiatives to improve the skills of their students. The University has been continuously trying to develop the skills of the students by providing them theoretical as well as

practical inputs on all the courses. Apart from this, attention is also paid to other areas/aspects such as spoken english, computer literacy, personality development etc. by encouraging the students to speak in English and complete the assignments by using computers.

*Performance enhancement for slow learners

Provision of remedial classes for the students belonging to weaker sections exist. In this, faculty encourages them, guides them for further upliftment in their career, so that they can excel in their lives. The University organizes various Programmes for skill development of the students. Department of Economics provides additional classes/ tutorials to any student who needs some academic support from the faculty irrespective of caste, class, creed, religion etc. All the departments are under obligation to provide remedial classes for slow learners as per guidelines of UGC.

*Exposure of students to other institutions of higher learning/corporate/business houses, etc.

Students of HRM & OB participated in TATA Crucible: the Campus Quiz and won Rs. 50000/-. Also the students won various prizes at The Business School, University of Jammu and other Institutions.

* Publication of student

Students of Department of TTM manage the publication of a newsletter titled "Travelism" on their own.

* Other facilities

The students get free transport facility for attending classes at Academic Block and Main Campus. The students are also provided free internet service in hostels, library, outside library at TAB and main campus. 5% leverage in attendance is provided for participation in extracurricular and extension activities, special tests and extra classes are held for the students who participate outside the university.

5.1.11 Does the university provide guidance and/or conduct coaching classes for students appearing for Civil Services, Defence Services, NET/SET and any other competitive examinations? If yes, what is the outcome?

- The University has initiated evening coaching for competitive exams in a formal manner for providing guidance to the students to appear in various competitive examination. Also informally, the faculty members guide the students for civil services, NET/SET and entrance examination for M.Phil./Ph.D as mentors.
- During the session 2013-14, an attempt was made to provide a two week (June-2014) counselling programme for UGC-NET/JRF examination, in which about 18 students were provided some useful tips about various domains of UGC-NET/JRF examinations. Out of 18 students, 7 (38.88%) qualified the UGC-NET/JRF examination conducted in the months of June/December-2014.

5.1.12 Mention the policies of the University for enhancing student participation in sports and extracurricular activities through strategies / schemes such as

• The University organises sports and cultural meet every year and encourages all departments to participate in variety of indoor and outdoor sports activities. The participation of students is always encouraging and they are motivated by giving prizes and appreciation certificates.

Additional academic support and academic flexibility in examinations is also provided. University organises UDAAN festival and Annual Sports meet in this regard.

The Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials any other (please specify)

A post of dietician is proposed in order to take care of dietary requirements of the students staying in the hostel. As of now, hostel warden is in-charge of this and he/she strictly maintains the diet chart in consultation with mess committee and ensures that proper nutrition is being provided to the students.

5.1.13 Does the university have an institutionalized mechanism for students' placement? What are the services provided to help students identify job opportunities, prepare themselves for interview, and develop entrepreneurship skills?

The Central Placement Cell of Central University of Jammu endeavours to facilitate and provide suitable placement to students in reputed multinationals, Government Organisations, NGO's and the private sector. It is in touch with leading national and multi-national companies. The Central Placement Cell organized Mega Placement Drive in collaboration with "NSDC-UDAAN" wherein more than 170 students across the State participated out of which 110 got placement offers from 19 participating cooperators.

5.1.15 Does the university have a registered Alumni Association? If yes, what are its activities and contributions to the development of the university?

Alumni association has been established in the University and steps have been initiated to keep the record of achievements of the members of alumni. The purpose of this association is to strengthen the ties between alumni, the community and the institution. The purpose of the association is to foster the spirit of loyalty and to promote the general welfare. The election of alumni association has been held and association has been constituted. The registration process is in progress. The alumni meet is held every year. The alumni provide feedback through their experiences on the problem faced by them relating to curriculum, teaching learning, support services, research, library, sports etc. It provides an eye opener for the university to bring improvements for the benefit of the students.

The University has student grievance redressal mechanism which gives students essential support to resolve their issues which are academic as well as non-academic in nature. A grievance redressal committee has been constituted to tide over the difficulties if any raised by the students. A suggestion box has been kept for seeking opinion of the students. Many changes have been incorporated on account of the same viz. change in library timings, internet facility, extension of bandwidth, provision of wi-fi facility in hostels. There is a cell named SPARSH i.e Sensitization, Prevention and Redressal of Sexual Harassment committee has been constituted by the University, under which University is having University Complaints Committee (UCC) and an apex body in order to address the issues and complaints filed by the student or employee of the University. Equal Opportunity Cell also addresses the issues and complaints of the University fraternity. The University ensures every person an equal opportunity at all levels irrespective of any caste, religion, race, creed, gender, sexual orientation, gender identity, gender expression, marital status, age, minorities, economically weaker section or disability.

5.1.17 Does the university promote a gender-sensitive environment by (i) conducting gender related programmes (ii) establishing cell and mechanism to deal with issues related to sexual harassment? Give details.

Yes, Department of Economics offers a course on Gender and Development to MA (Semester IV) students to promote gender-sensitive environment. SPARSH i.e Sensitization, Prevention and Redressal of Sexual Harassment sensitizes the University fraternity towards various issues of contemporary significance through programmes, lectures, street plays etc. Equal Opportunity Cell creates conducive atmosphere for healthy interpersonal relations among students. The University organises lectures on gender equity programmes and women empowerment on regular basis.

Yes, there is anti-ragging committee at the University level. The objective of this committee is to prohibit, prevent and eliminate the scourge of ragging including any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student. The students are sensitized about Anti-ragging Act which is published in prospectus besides banners and sign boards are placed at different places in the TAB and at campus to awaken the students about the ill effects of ragging.

Workshops are organised from time to time to discuss the expected learning outcomes of the students. The faculty regularly visits the field work agencies to discuss the development of students placed there. Students also formulate a term plan to be followed in line with the field work objectives of each semester in consultation with the faculty and the agency. The University also collaborates with NGOs for carrying out community development programmes. The University is trying to collaborate with NGO named SEHYOG in this regard. Eminent lecture series is a good initiative by the university towards the overall development of the students. The University obtains the feedback from various stakeholders on different issues. The alumni association, industry-academia interaction, seminars and meeting of various committees also help in

The University celebrated "Youth Day" in technical support from Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, wherein more than 90 students participated in 03 events.

Facilities for sports and other co-curricular activities are available at the Central University of Jammu. These include outdoor games such as volleyball; badminton, shot-put and basketball. Various competitions are also organised by the University like UDAAN and Annual Sports Meets, the women candidates are encouraged to participate.

A newsletter titled "Travelism" is being published by the students of the Department of TTM. One student from each department has been selected under SPARSH for participation of the students in the activities of road shows for creating awareness. Department of HRM carries out Friday Club activities which include training students on various entrepreneurial skills. Department of Economics conducts seminars regularly on Fridays for discussions on various burning economic issues.

Vision

To be a leading Centre of higher learning, integrating culture, knowledge, philosophy and value system of our heritage with modern and emerging concepts, skills, technology and management practices.

- Develop talent for sustainable growth in academics, administration, business and research by laying emphasis on organised thought, self-discipline and discriminative faculty.
- Encouraging inter-disciplinary focus, as also collaborative research with leading Institutions aimed at the optimum development of human resource and integration of new ideas and innovations.
- Provide a modern, environmentally sustainable, healthy and vibrant Campus in consonance with the principles of Green technology.
- Play participatory role in the affairs of people of surrounding areas in particular and civil society in general.

6.1.1. Does the mission statement define the institution's distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society the students it seeks to serve, the institution's tradition and value orientations, its vision for the future, etc?

The Central University of Jammu is a nascent institute with five years of existence but aspires to become a centre of excellence by setting a standard in terms of building institutional characteristic of global standard that would deliver service to the society. The University adopts a student-centred and human resource focused approach for the overall development of students that set itself apart from its peer institutes. As the mission outlines explicitly, it desires to engage with the society at various levels in order to advance the progress and development of humanity through innovation and participation. It also aims to inculcate the values and traditions enshrined in the mission among the students and scholars to realise their dream and potential to transform the society.

The University is engaged in teaching, research and extension activities in selected fields of academics and research at Maters level and Integrated M.Phil Ph.D programme. It creates a strong interface with society through its various outreach, extra-mural, extension and research related programmes.

6.1.2 How is the leadership involved

The leadership is involved in keeping the sanctity of vision and mission of the University intact. The leadership in collaboration with statutory bodies and IQAC ensures that the policies and the action plans are in tandem with the stated vision and mission of the University. The leadership is also involved

through regular meetings with faculty, administration and other staff by periodically reviewing the policies.

• In ensuring the organisation's management system development, implementation and continuous improvement?

In order to develop university's management system, the leadership regularly reviews its functioning, processes and introduces new technological supports. Also it allows and encourages its administrative staff to attend orientation and refresher programmes so that they can update themselves with the modern way of working.

• In interacting with its stakeholders?

The Vice- Chancellor follows a democratic and open door policy of leadership. Any faculty and staff can freely approach him in his office. The Vice-Chancellor himself encourages all the stakeholders to approach him for any suggestions or grievances. He interacts with stakeholders such as students, faculty and other staff through periodic interactions held by the University. Similarly, all the offices maintain transparency in maintaining the records, the files are numbered and any record can be retrieved in a transparent manner. In general, there are induction programmes, annual day programme and regular faculty meetings where the leadership interacts with students and faculty. Moreover, it interacts with the alumni, parents and prospective employers, industries through various forums. By such interactions, the leadership ensures that university is moving on the path shown by its vision and mission.

• In reinforcing a culture of excellence?

The leadership is committed to reinforce the culture of excellence in all the aspects of teaching-learning processes in the campus. All the faculty members are encouraged to impart quality education through traditional and innovative learning practices. The teaching plans for all courses of all Departments have been uploaded on website, so that students can keep a regular track of their course and syllabus. Efforts are also made to provide a creative academic environment by encouraging independent thinking and exploration. Students are also provided participative platforms by organising cultural programmes and sports activities due to support from the leadership which not only exhibits but helps in development of their talent. Not only students are supported, but faculty members are also encouraged to produce good academic work and it has been announced that they will be rewarded by the University for any exemplary work. The University thus reinforces a culture of excellence by awarding faculty members, research scholars and students for their excellent work in terms of monetary rewards, certificates and other benefits.

• In identifying organisational needs and striving to fulfil them?

The needs of the organisation are reviewed from time-to-time and discussed with the stakeholders. There is a proper mechanism for such reviews and parallel committees have been set up which informs the leadership about the needs and how to fulfil them.

The University administration encourages the faculty members of all denominations to participate in management of both academic and administrative affairs through various committees. For instance, the faculty members are invited to participate in the recruitment process of teaching and non-teaching staffs. In addition, the University engages the faculty members for planning any development activities within the University. Examples are Departmental committees, BoS, Schools Board and other committees which are constituted for ensuring participation management.

There is no provision for affiliated colleges as of now in the University mandate. The decisions are taken by the University are based on participation of concerned faculty member/bodies.

There is no provision for autonomous colleges as of now in the University mandate.

The University encourages faculty to constructively engage in the management of the institution and even include them in decision-making process through fair appointments to head various committees to perform academic as well as administrative activities. At the departmental level, it involves faculty, students to organise major events of the University such as Foundation Day, Cultural Programmes, Nukkad Natak shows, Sports Meet etc., in order to groom their organisation skills. Class Representative election is a routine process, Gender champions from SPARSH again help the students to groom

leadership qualities among the students. Also, the entrepreneurial activity and fest are being totally managed by the students under the membership of faculty members.

6.1.9 Has the university evolved a knowledge management strategy? If yes, give details.

Yes, the University has evolved a knowledge management strategy which is oriented towards generation and dissemination of knowledge by easy access and effective implementation of knowledge management technologies like ICT and E-learning resources. The resources available are:

- Online Access of Emerald, Sage, Cengage Learning and Elsevier
- Inflibnet Database is subscribed by the university
- Computing Lab with Statistical Software Packages SPSS is subscribed by the University for Data Analysis purpose.
- The Temporary Academic Block along with the main campus is Wi-Fi enabled.
- E-governance or paperless office has been implemented to a large exent.

6.1.10 How are the following values reflected the functioning of the university?

- Contributing to National Development: The University celebrates all national days like Independence Day/ Republic Day/ Gandhi Jayanti/ Unity Day with active participation from faculty and students which inculcates national values among them. The University has also started National Service Scheme (NSS) which regularly conducts various activities for the development of the students.
- **Fostering global competencies among students:** The University under its flagship programme, Eminent Lecture Series, invites nationally and internationally reputed speakers from various disciplines which provides a platform for students/scholars to exchange ideas. Curriculum of all the departments is periodically renewed in order to foster global competencies among students. The university encourages the department to include representatives from industries in the curriculum making process.
- Inculcating a sound value system among students Promoting use of technology: The University regularly conducts various programmes to inculcate soft skills among the students and scholars. This includes research methodology course, communication skills, and computer and information technology skills. Class rooms of all the departments are equipped with smart boards and projectors in order to promote world class teaching standards. Students are exposed to interactive methods of teaching using multimedia kits.
- Quest for excellence: Most of the programmes organised or conducted by the University are tailormade to achieve excellence in the respective areas at par with global standards. For instance, the faculty members of the university are encouraged to participate/organise international conferences, seminars and workshops. Students and scholars are also encouraged to take internship or participate in career development programmes in order to achieve excellence.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

Yes, the perspective plan for development of policies and strategies in order to achieve overall excellence is done periodically.

* Vision and mission:

To be a leading Centre of higher learning, integrating culture, knowledge, philosophy and value system of our heritage with modern and emerging concepts, skills, and technology and management practices.

* Teaching and learning:

Teaching learning process at the University is planned for a semester and the University follows Choice-Based-Credit (CBCS) system as per UGC guidelines since 2015. The syllabus for every semester is prepared by the faculty members of the Department in accordance with the UGC norms and duly verified and approved by the Board of Studies (BoS), which convenes twice in an academic year (If required more such meetings may be convened) The members of the BoS include external experts and industrial representatives. These approved syllabii are taught by qualified and trained faculty members. Students are also trained to access various internet sources besides using library. Attendance of students is regularly maintained and monthly reviewed by the Head of the Department. The workload of each faculty members is equally distributed and monitored monthly. Apart from class room lectures, students are asked to participate in weekly seminars and tutorials. This is counted in the internal assessment of the students' performance for continuous evaluation of the students. The teaching and learning process is reviewed on regular basis from the following:

- Student's Feedback Mechanism
- Continuous Internal Assessments
- Mid Semester Examinations
- Quality of Term papers
- Final results of semester exams
- Peer Review
- Field/Industrial visits

*Research and development

Research is the primary focus of the University. In order to strengthen the research capacity of the University, a Research committee has been constituted to monitor and facilitate the research activities. All the departments are encouraged to apply for research grants from various sources including UGC and international organisations. Faculty is trained through various workshops to gain knowledge about research projects and funding opportunities. Some of the departments have signed MoUs with leading industries and prominent institutes for research collaborations. The University also encourages innovative research to develop new models or invent new methods on complex issues in both sciences and social sciences. The University also awards Minor Research Projects (MRP) for the faculty member by awarding a fund of Rs. 3 lakhs for each Department.

* Community engagement

Community engagement is part of University's outreach activities in which it aims to foster close relationship with the society. The University under different programmes such as *Swach Bharat Abhiyan*, *Unnat Bharat Abhiyan* actively engages with the communities in and around its campus. Besides this, it is also planning to launch a community radio for the service of the society. It also organises community programmes to create awareness on issues like water management, cleanliness, child education and health. The Department of Social work conducts surveys on regular basis. Adoption of villages, Panchayats & Schools is also important activity that shows community engagement. The NSS unit of the University also organises various outreach programmes. The NSS unit has been conducting Community Awareness Programme district Administration, Samba.

* Human resource planning and development

It is one of the core vision of the University to transform human beings into effective human resources for the benefit of society and environment. To this, the University adopts comprehensive strategies for over all development of faculty, students and allied members of the system. The FDP's are conducted at regular intervals also the faculty is encouraged to attend development programmes.

* Industry interaction


The University encourages departments particularly those belonging to professional courses to proactively engage with industries in order to meet their human capital requirement thus contribute to economic growth and national development. Some of the departments have made representatives from the industry to be part of curriculum development process such as member of BoS. Moreover, students at the end of last semester are sent to industries for industrial training in order to gain professional experiences. The University has also created career placement cell, which identifies and documents potential industries at national and international level and facilitates interactions with all levels.

Apart from strengthening the existing teaching and learning system for maintaining academic rigor, the University endeavours to expand the ambit of existing programmes in emerging areas to create linkages with international universities/organisations.

*Internationalisation

Yes, the University promotes international outreach by encouraging faculty/scholars to Participate in international seminars / conferences / workshops. Most of the faculty members participate in international seminars / workshops/conference at regular intervals. It also invites eminent scholars with international reputation to deliver lectures in the University.

6.2.3 Does the university have a formal policy to ensure quality? How is it designed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

- Yes, the University has a formal policy of ensuring quality in both academic and administrative activities.
- The University has established the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) in 2014 as per the requirement of NAAC. The IQAC has been re-christened as Directorate of Internal Quality Assurance (DIQA). The directorate has the responsibility to enhance the quality of all academic and administrative activities by planning, guiding and monitoring the quality.
- The DIQA formed a steering committee to draft the Quality Assurance (QA) manual on defined parameters.
- Apart from this, the University strives to maintain highest standards of teaching, training, research and consultancy. In this respect, each School of the University has a School Board and every Department in the School has its own Board of Studies. These boards meet on regular basis and prepare the quality curriculum and syllabi as per UGC guidelines and keeping in view the requirements, the courses/syllabi are also modified. The quality radar system is in the process of being established at the University and audits by Departmental co-ordinators from each Department is in process of implementation.

6.2.4 Does the university encourage its academic departments to function independently and autonomously and how does it ensure accountability?

Yes, the University encourages its academic departments to function independently and autonomously through internal structures such as Board of Studies, School Board which ensures the accountability of the Departments. The functions and responsibilities are well defined in ordinances.

- The University has constituted grievances cell to address the complaints from students and scholars. The members of these cells are drawn from both administration and academic with a representative from students or scholars. The University's student grievance redressal cell's mechanism gives students essential support to resolve their issues which are academic as well as non-academic in nature.
- There is a committee named SPARSH i.e Sensitization, Prevention and Redressal of Sexual Harassment under which University is having University Complaints Committee (UCC) in order to address the issues and complaints filed by the students or employees of the Uuniversity. Equal Opportunity Cell also addresses the issues and complaints of the university fraternity.
- There is also an Anti Ragging Committee(ARC) whose objective is to prohibit, prevent and eliminate the scourge of ragging including any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student. Students are also sensitized on these issues through various programmes and seminars.
- 6.2.7 Does the university have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the institutional response?

Yes, the University through IQAC cell analyses student feedback on institutional performance and the responses from the institute is constructive. The feedback analysed and report is sent confidentially to HOD of each department for discussing the same with respective teachers.

- **6.3** Faculty Empowerment Strategies
- 6.3.1 What efforts have been made to enhance the professional development of teaching and non-teaching staff?

The University has established Faculty Induction and Development Cell (FIDC) to prepare Service Training Module for newly inducted young teachers. Further, it encourages Faculty members to organise workshops/seminars/conferences/capacity building programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff for the professional enhancement of teaching and non-teaching staff such as Hindi language training. University periodically sends faculty members to participate general orientation and refresher courses organised by Human Resource Development Centres across the country.

- Faculty Induction and Development Cell (FIDC) ensures:
 - Adherence of UGC norms in recruitment and promotion of faculty members. Implementation of Academic Performance Indicators (API) methodology through performance based appraisal system (PBAS) of UGC as a means to assess the performance of the faculty.
- FIDC prepares a calender of recruitment / promotions of faculty
- Encouraging faculty members to pursue PhD for those who lack the same
- Providing study leave, sabbatical leave, providing opportunities to attend orientation/ refresher/ seminars/conferences
- Providing financial support for undertaking projects
- Financial support as contingency to teachers undergoing Ph.D
- Promotes and encourages quality research
- Promotes faculty to take up consultancy
- Promotes faculty members and departments to be a members of professional bodies

6.3.2 What is the outcome of the review of various appraisal methods used by the university? List the important decisions.

There are statutory bodies in the University to review and suggest various appraisal methods for the growth and functioning of the university. Personal Appraisal Reports are submitted by teachers as per UGC requirement. Feedback is given to teachers on their performance and there is a considerable improvement in the academic and research output of teachers.

The University has institutionalised the following welfare schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff:

- Central Government Health Schemes (CGHS)
- LTC & Home town facility is provided.
- National Pension Scheme (NPS).
- Free medical consultations and minor treatment facilities for all teaching and non-teaching staff is provided 24x7.
- Staff quarters are coming up at main campus situated at Bagla, Samba.
- Free transport facility for students, teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Other schemes prescribed by UGC and GoI from time to time.

6.3.4 What are the measures taken by the University for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The University invites good faculty and reinforces them by providing advance increments. Also the University provides a supportive environment for the academic growth of such faculty members. It also includes eminent personalities from various fields in its authoritative bodies like Court, Executive Council, Academic Council etc. The University also provides housing facility, travelling facility, LTC and few other supportive housing facilities like TV, fridge, furniture etc. as per the ordinance to the invited faculty members.

6.3.5 Has the university conducted a gender audit during the last four years? If yes, mention a few salient findings.

The University has started its functioning on 08.08.2011 and till now it has completed just five years since its establishment. In this short span, the University has worked with the staff on contract basis as regular positions of Administrative staff were filled in the month of May, 2014 onwards. The University has constituted an Apex Body of SPARSH (ABS) and University Complaints Committee (UCC) to ensure gender sensitization. The gender audit is under process. SAKSHAM has be implemented and the need survey is being done to access the gender issues and challenges.

The SPARSH committee conducts regular workshops, seminars, counselling drives etc. for creating an environment that promotes gender equality.

6.3.6 Does the university conduct any gender sensitization programmes for its faculty?

The University has constituted a committee to address the grievances of gender related issues called 'SPARSH'. The committee organises various programmes in order to sensitize students, scholars, faculty and staff about gender issues such as work place harassment and discrimination. SAKSHAM also helps in building capacities for self defence among female faculty members.

6.3.7 What is the impact of the University's Academic Staff College Programmes in enhancing the competencies of the university faculty?

The university has not established its own Academic Staff College as yet, however it supports the faculty members to join the orientation and refresher courses at other ASCs in order to enhance their competencies.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism available to monitor the effective and efficient use of financial resources?

The accounts of the Central University of Jammu are being prepared on accrual accounting basis. This is in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the MHRD in respect of Educational Institutions. There is a Finance Committee, a statutory body established under the Act, 2000 to prepare annual budget, annual accounts and review the same every quarterly. The proceedings of the Finance Committee are being scrutinized by the Syndicate and approved there of. The Deans Committee headed by the Vice Chancellor also monitors fund raising and effective utilization of funds so generated. The University finances are regularly audited by the internal and external auditors. There is a space provided in the Main Administrative Building for housing Government Audit Department.

the State Accounts Department, to ensure transparency and financial prudence in the University was functional till Oct., 2015. Now the University has assigned the responsibility to Deputy Registrar for maintaining efficiency in financial activities of the University.

The post of finance officer has been advertised and a permanent finance officer shall be appointed for a period of five years.

6.4.2 Does the university have a mechanism for internal and external audit? Give details.

The Audit on the accounts of the University is conducted by Indian Audit and Accounts Department. The post of the Internal Audit Officer has been advertised to strengthen the internal auditing.

6.4.3 Are the institution's accounts audited regularly? Have there been any major audit objections, if so, how were they addressed?

The accounts of the University are being audited on regular intervals. As per latest Audit report issued on the accounts of the Central University of Jammu, all the outstanding paras have been settled except two, the reply of which is also being furnished along with the reply for the current year report.

6.4.4 Provide the audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the last four years.

The income and expenditure statements for the period 2011-12, 2012-13, 2013-14, 2014-15 and 2015-16 are reflected in the table:

Further, the Central University of Jammu strictly follows the guidelines for utilization of funds for which the finance committee has been constituted. Regular meetings of Finance Committee, Academic Council and Executive Council are being held as per the requirement till the decisions are taken after deliberations in the meetings. The income and expenditure statements are presented in the following table.

6.4.5 Narrate the efforts taken by the University for Resource Mobilization.

The University is completely funded by the UGC. Against the approved outlay of Rs.391.00 cr under the 12th Five Year Plan an amount of Rs. 225.07 cr has been incurred upto 30.09.2015 against the release of Rs.240.00 cr. The University has internal resource on account of fee from students and interest on deposits.

6.4.6 Is there any provision for the university to create a corpus fund? If yes, give details.

The powers of the Executive Council as given in the Central Universities Act, 2009, inter-alia provides for creating a corpus fund to invest any money to the University, including any unapplied income, in such stocks, funds, share or securities, from time to time, as it may think fit or in the purchase of immovable property in India, with the like powers of varying such investment from time to time, to institute fellowships, scholarships, studentship, medals and prizes.

Finance Officer Central University of Jammu

The University has a structured mechanism for conducting timely academic audit. Board of Studies meeting is conducted on regular intervals to take introspection for the existing curriculum. Apart from the BOS, academic council meetings are also held to take minutes of BOS and other recommendations into account. The University court and Executive council also carry on regular audits of various University functions.

6.5.2 Based on the recommendations of the academic audit, what specific measures have been taken by the university to improve teaching, learning and evaluation?

Post recommendation from Board of Studies, Academic Council, Executive Council and University Court, the Departments incorporate specific changes that help in keeping pace with changing dynamics of academia. Curriculum, Examination patterns, teaching pedagogy are regularly updated and aligned as per the recommendations received.

6.5.3 Is there a central body within the university to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

In order to review the teaching learning process, DIQA at the University monitors the entire process. At the end of each semester the feedback is collected from the faculty as well as students regarding syllabi competition, attendance and quality of teaching pedagogy by the departmental DIQA representative. Few benchmark parameters adopted by the university to ensure quality in teaching learning process are as follows:

Attendance: Minimum 75% attendance to appear in the end semester exam.

Pass percentage: Minimum 50% aggregate marks are required for passing. Separate passing in Internal and Mid semester examination put together and external examinations.

Apex body constituted by DIQA evaluates the feedbacks received and recommends the changes accordingly. The University is in the process of creating a forward mechanism in the Quality Radar System wherein the Quality initiatives for incorporating the corrective actions will be put in place.

6.5.4 How has IQAC contributed to institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes?

From the very beginning on the recommendation of the Vice Chancellor, separate Directorate of Internal Quality Assurance was formulated in the year 2014 to monitor and suggest the quality improvements required with respect to various quality related parameters of the University. The DIQA cell started conducting various meetings among different stakeholders to understand the various dimensions of quality and developed a proper strategy to improvise upon the same. Departmental representatives were also selected to help in executing the strategies at microscopic level

6.5.5 How many decisions of the IQAC have been placed before the statutory authorities of the University for Implementation?

The report of the DIQA is periodically submitted to the statutory authority of the University for Implementation.

6.5.6 Does the IQAC have external members on its committees? If so, mention any significant contribution made by such members.

Yes. DIQA has external members. The significant contribution of external members is a)Quality consultations

- b) Industry academia interface strengthening
- c) Resource persons for various quality related workshops.

6.5.7 Has the IQAC conducted any study on the incremental academic growth of students from disadvantaged sections of society?

The DIQA is in the process of commencing a detailed study on the incremental academic growth of the students from disadvantaged sections of society. However, the University organises remedial classes for the students/scholars belonging to such sections in every semester. Besides, the University also organised Research Methodology workshop in collaboration with ICSSR as part of capacity building exercise for the students/scholars. Further, University has also organised programmes on IPR, statistical analysis sponsored by different funding agencies. Remedial classes, innovation, incubation, entrepreneurship lecture series, mentoring and eminent lecture series provides comprehensive orientation to weaker students for improving their academic credentials.

6.5.8 What policies are in place for the periodic review of administrative and academic departments, subject areas, research centres, etc.?

The University adopts quality radar system to periodically assess the quality of teaching and research as well as administrative efficiency besides different authorities of the University also reviews the administrative and academic functioning.

7.1 Environmental Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the university conduct a Green Audit of its campus?

The campus of Central University of Jammu is being developed following the GRIHA 5 guidelines however, various measures have been taken to ensure reduced consumption of power and water resources. These include regular reporting, as well as regular monitoring of consumption. Further, the University has submitted DPR under the green campus initiative of Ministry of New and Renewable Energy for developing solar park in the campus.

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the university to make the campus eco-friendly?

Energy Efficiency

- Orientation Most of the buildings and habitable/working spaces have North-South (\pm 15 degrees) orientation, so as to maximize gains for natural light into habitable spaces.
- Small Windows With scientifically designed opening sizes so as to allow for glare free lighting into the space most of the times. Areas with glazing are kept to the minimum required.
- Light Coloured External Finishes The external finishing materials of the building are buff color sandstone, sandstone exposed aggregate plaster and concrete, so as to absorb minimum heat and reflect most of it keeping spaces inside cooler.
- Wall with insulating and/or autoclaved aerated concrete (AAC) block Walls have been provided with AAC block or externally insulated (extruded polystyrene) over brick walls, so as to minimize heat gain into the building spaces and thereby reducing energy consumption in cooling spaces.
- Cross Ventilated Spaces Most habitable spaces have cross ventilation through properly sized and placed operable windows, so as to open them during fair weather and reduce air conditioning need. Maximize use of sunlight, solar water heating, use of energy efficient lights are in practice.

Water Efficiency

- The University has many water harvesting pits through this we capture most of the rain water and minimize the run off.
- Five Water bodies are being created in the campus with a Total water harvesting capacity of 80 Lakh Gallons through Watershed Development Programme.
- The University is also planning to go for Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting.
- The use of RO rejected water for Gardening purpose is already in operation.
- University has developed its own sewerage treatment plant for optimal utilization of water resources.

Use of renewable energy

• The University has adopted the use of solar energy by installing the Solar Energy Panels on the roof top of its buildings, solar street lights have also been/are being installed. The installation of Solar water heaters at the roof top of the hostels are also being planned. Additionally installation of solar panels along the boundary wall is also planned which will ensure the illumination of the campus.

Check dam construction

• Five Water bodies are developed in the campus with a total water harvesting capacity of 80 Lakh Gallons through Watershed Development Programme.

Plantation

• Thick green belt of adequate width has been raised in the campus. Native species of trees have been planted. The University is adopting a Water Efficient Landscaping with designated plant/tree species. To control soil erosion of the slopes, cut slope technique is used by Geo synthetic technique, 3D Erosion Control and Hydro seeding. Also, for embankment Geo synthetic technique along with Hydro seeding is used, this has resulted in conservation of soil and sustainable landscaping.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the university.

- Many innovations for the academic programs have been incorporated for enabling the passouts to become employable. For administering and functioning of the university, a key innovation has been the use of technology in all aspects of administration. Some of these uses are:
- Use of Building Management System (BMS) for HVAC control, access control system (for entry into labs), etc.
- Email groups for communicating amongst faculty, office, different batches, students enrolled in a course, student council, etc. email groups have been created.
- Email based administration all requests to the administration are made on email and resolved through email. Where needed, hard copies are maintained in the background, without the user being aware of it.
- Shared documents and Google Drive Students make all their submissions online not just through email but largely through the cloud, for example they share their Digital Art Assignments through Google Drive and their work is assessed on line without any downloads.
- ERP management of academic processes like registration, grade management, scheduling, student records, etc are in the process of being implemented through ERP.
- Coir based duster is in use by Department of Environmental Sciences (This is plastic free and wood free duster with long self- life carved from Carpet tiles). It helps in saving the expenditure incurred on purchase of Plastic Duster by the University.
- The Campus pathway is designed in a friendly manner for Physically Challenged and Visually Impaired people for making their mobility easier.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Give details of any two best practices which have contributed to better academic and administrative functioning of the university.

PRACTICE I

1. Title of the Practice

Learner centric course design and delivery

2. Objectives of the Practice

The objective of this program is to design courses keeping the learning objectives in mind, and then design the instruction and assessment plans to deliver them. Through this practice, students graduating will have the desired knowledge and skills, which the program aims to develop.

3. The Context

Most of the course designs are 'learner centric'. The aim of the course design is to develop knowledge and skills of students through a blend of strategic perspectives and realized through innovative design based upon transactional methods rather than instructional methods and implementation of both formal curricula and co-curricular activities.

4. The Practice

Each course has been designed to meet the specific set of learning objectives and expected outcome. These are comprehensively discussed and approved in the faculty meetings. Once the learning objectives are set, the instruction and assessment plans are designed. These plans ensure the learning effectiveness of the students. Moreover they are also assessed on the basis of assignments, presentations, fieldwork; independent research projects etc as appropriate in particular course and are given fair feedback on their performance.

5. Evidence of Success

The practice has been in place since the inception of the university. This practice has fostered the learning appetite amongst the students and strengthened the teaching and learning culture in the university premises. The Central University's creatively designed Post graduate programmes like MBA (TTM) and MBA (HRM) and others are receiving overwhelming response from the reputed companies and they offer good salary packages.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The main problem faced is that students lack the motivation, which needs to be addressed by more effective student—teacher interactions. The students need to develop an insight and perspective which in turn will promote a healthy learning atmosphere so that the teaching—learning culture could be promoted.

7. Coaching classes for Civil Services Examination

Coaching classes for Centre and State Civil Services Examination were arranged for students in which 180 candidates attended the classes which went on for 48 days. Dr. D.L. Choudhary was the convener for the course, the major participants were from weaker section of the society.

8. Parent Teacher Meeting for B.Voc. courses has been introduced to involve all stake holders along with Community outreach activity.

PRACTICE II

1. Title of the Practice

National Tourism Entrepreneurship Development Summit (NTEDS)

1. Objectives of the Practice

- To promote innovation and entrepreneurship in the field of tourism.
- To create awareness among the youth of the country pursuing different tourism programmes to undertake tourism entrepreneurship as a career option.
- To provide a forum to the professionally educated youth with entrepreneurial acumen where they can showcase their dreams and feel facilitated in realizing their dreams through multifaceted governmental interventions.
- To generate a forum for participation where different perspectives are pooled to understand their practical implementation.

3. The Context

Entrepreneurship and innovation are critical factors in tourism and are both central to the continued success and development of the industry, both globally and regionally. According to the World Travel and Tourism Council (WTTC), by the year 2020, tourism industry in India will be the second largest employer and shall contribute significantly to the Indian economy. The industry is in the transformation phase and would require high quality professionals for its sustainable growth. The industry also provides tremendous opportunities for innovation and developing products and services with small initial capital investment. The living examples are Yatra.com, makemytrip.com, Redbus.in, ITZ Card, Bed and Breakfast Scheme; Budget hotels have totally changed the way tourism entrepreneurship is conceived today. Further each state in the country has huge potential to identify the Lesser Known High Potential Destinations (LKHPD) or promote existing destinations to the international market. The industry also ensures enough leverage for customization and encourages the development of products and experiences that educate about the need for conservation and preservation of natural and cultural heritage of India.

4. The Practice

National Tourism Entrepreneurship Development Summit (NTEDS) is the pioneering initiative of its own kind by the Department of Tourism and Travel Management, Central University of Jammu to promote tourism entrepreneurship in the country. This national level event organized with the objective of creating the awareness about the entrepreneurial opportunities available for the students pursuing different tourism programs in various universities and institutions across the country.

5. Evidence of Success

- The NTEDS has helped students in getting an exposure, how to start business enterprises with project management skills.
- Students are very enthusiastic and passionate about the entrepreneurship summit and the participation

in this event ranges from 40 to 50.

- It is completely student driven event. Students not only coordinate the entire event, but also manage it. The event also fosters good relationship and interaction among students, educators, entrepreneurs and industry professionals.
- Students get exposure by organizing and conducting events. This has helped students in improving their communication and interpersonal skills.
- NTEDS has helped in improving networking and Peer to Peer learning among the students. The entrepreneurial spirit has increased among the participants.
- The NTEDS has been able to develop itself as a brand from Central University of Jammu.
- The house comprised of tourism entrepreneurs, managers, educators and students unanimously approved that NTEDS has to be much bigger and pan India event in coming year, 2016.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Typical problems sometimes include getting good speakers in a location such as Jammu. Finalizing a feasible schedule involving a galaxy of speakers is a big challenge. Coordinating the event and liasioning with professionals is a challenge. Students are not familiar with funding support and financial system for new venture in India. Sometime, there is delay in payment related to cost of travel and other expenses to participants from their institutions. The financial resources (for organizing the event, prize/award) needs to be increased. The event venue within the university (TAB) requires more improvement.

OTHER BEST PRACTICES

1. Industry Academia Interface: Involvement of practioner / Industry experts for formulation of curricula. The University has been able to build a strong industry-academia interface for the benefit of the students and faculty. Following initiatives are worth mentioning. In this regard, University has initiated eminent lecture series wherein prominent personalities who have contributed in their respective fields are invited periodically for interaction with students and faculty.

The University recently organized a three days HRD congress with an objective to strengthen the links between University and Corporate Houses. The event witnessed participation of top notch industry leaders form almost 30 corporate(s). Keeping in view the restricted industrial exposure for students of the State, the event not only provided the platform to the students of CUJ but also to other academic institutions of the region. Through this event the University was able to provide corporate guidance and training for students and faculties across the disciplines. Furthermore, through HRD Congress the University was able to generate training, mentorship and placement avenues for faculty and students respectively. Recently that is from 28th to 29th November, 2016 a mega placement drive under UDAAN was organised by the University wherein 167 candidates from across the state appeared for interview before 18 companies from different sectors.

Also Corporate Immersion and leadership programme has been initiated with an objective to sensitize the professionals towards the grass level understanding of industry and practicum that attempts to connect classroom learning with real time environment. This includes summer internship, enterprise

learning, experiential learning and corporate mentoring.

2. Focus on entrepreneurship and skill based learning: Entrepreneurial activities are preiodically conducted across all the disciplines. The University is offering Entrepreneurship and skill based course across 34 programmes being offered by the Department of the University which facilitates the absorption of students in respective industries besides starting their own enterprises. Further, the University has also initiated the Campus Start-up Track for promoting innovation/technology benefitting community at large. As a part of its outreach activities, the University has adopted five villages under Jung Panchayat and adopted Schools under these villages for Capacity Building of Teachers/Administrators and Students-Oriented Support Programmes.

The University is also conducting capacity building training programmes on Effective managerial Skills for local artisans and Kalamkari workers.

Innovation Incubation and Entrepreneurship: The Central University of Jammu has established Innovation, Incubation and Entrepreneurship Council (IIEC) under which University Innovation Cell (UIC) and University Business Incubation Centre is functioning. UIC has identified 15 grass root innovators besides documenting the medical plant diversity of the campus spread over an area of 610 acres in the form of herbarium, the process has been initiated on the extraction and enhancement of the potential molecules having commercial value. Also, mapped diversity has been displayed on a wall which is named as Innovation wall of the University. Moreover, 01 IP has also been initiated.

At present 07 incubatees have been registered under UBIC for incubation assistance. Further, 01 incubatee has already been recommended for funding under Start-up India Scheme. Moreover, in order to promote the concept of IPR among students and faculty as well as local entrepreneurs', university is regularly organizing IPR workshops/lectures. UBIC has also collaborated with apex industry body Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) for formulating start up policy for Jammu and Kashmir State and provide mentoring to incubatees.

- 4. **Student Centric initiatives :** Curricular and Sports activities relating to the students in all spheres is a regular feature of the University. Some of the positive aspects of student driven initiatives are as under:
- Annual Scholarship to Meritorious students
- Eminent Lecture Series : 1 lecture per month
- Online E-resources available in library

6. Environmental Management

In order to help preserve natural resources and reduce pollution, campuses are in the process of purchasing environmentally preferable products.

Recycled Paper

CUJ is in the process of adopting a new policy which ensures that copy paper used on campus contains at least 30% recycled materials. The University must switch to 100% post-consumer recycled, chlorine-free paper for routine use in copiers and printers. Therefore, a policy is being framed in this regard. Faculty members make their courses paper-less by having students hand in their assignments online.

Computer Procurement Policies

CUJ has replaced CRT monitors with LCD monitors, which use only about a third to one half the energy of a CRT. The University is in the process of adopting the guidelines for buying greener electronics, disposing of "e-waste" and so called "take-back" recycling, which places the burden of e-waste recycling and disposal on the electronics manufacturers


CUJ is in the process of a "take-back" recycling policy in its purchasing contracts, which includes a provision to send back all electronics packaging.

Reusable Bottles

CUJ ensures to purchase and distribute reusable aluminum water bottles to all of the approximately first 400 new students admitted to various Departments on Orientation Day. This is in the process of adoption by the University. The students are expected to bring the bottles to all orientation events in order to reduce plastic bottle and cup waste thus ensuring reduced consumption of non renewable plastic waste.

Green Cleaning Products

The University is in the process of adopting a green cleaning policy that states that the University will only use cleaning products that meet Green Seal standard or products with low-volatile organic compounds (VOC), purchase chemicals that are automatically and accurately diluted using cold water, and use products that are packed with recycled materials.



Good Practices followed at Central University of Jammu

A. Academic

- 1. The University prepares a detailed academic calendar at the beginning of every academic year and all activities are carried out while strictly adhering to the same.
- 2. Orientation Programme for newly admitted students is conducted at the beginning of every academic year. The students are familiarized with the facilities and the scope which the University offers and made known the expectations bestowed upon them.
- 3. The faculty members donate books to library and a book bank is being run.
- 4. The Central Library, which has a vast repository of books, journals, periodicals and online resources, is ably supported by the dedicated staff.
- 5. A Comprehensive and Continuous Evaluation process has been adopted for all programmes of study in the University. The semester system is in place since inception. The Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is also in place for all programmes of study.
- 6. A fair examination process is in place and the marks of each examination for each course (subject) secured by the students are displayed on the Departmental Notice Board within 48 hours from the examination. The answer scripts are shown to the students and are encouraged to clarify doubts, if any.
- 7. The University gives emphasis on experimental learning and undergraduate research.
- 8. The students and faculty are incentivised for cutting-edge research. Exceptional research work is also appreciated in public forum. The University has program of providing start-up grants for faculty to set up laboratories and carry out research. Due recognition is also accorded to students who excel in various co-curricular activities like quiz, debates, drama, music, orchestra *etc*.
- 9. The students are encouraged to do summer and winter internships at reputed institutions outside.
- 10. The University conducts a series of eminent lectures highlighting the contemporary issues across disciplines.
- 11. There is an active Innovation, Incubation and Entrepreneurship Council
- 12. The University has a Teachers Club which holds regular interactions and meetings.
- 13. The University follows the policy of granting its faculty members 'Research Semester' a period in which other academic duties of the faculty are lessened in order to enable her/him to devote in full-time research activities in the department.
- 14. The University, in order to recognize the contributions of faculty, has instituted the 'Best Teacher Award' for the faculty members who have made significant contribution towards innovative teaching that has impacted society, conducted quality research that has added new knowledge in a particular domain, has industrial applications and whose efforts have been nationally and internationally recognized.

B. Administration

- 1. The Vice Chancellor follows an open door policy for interaction with students and staff.
- 2. The administrative processes of the University are fast and prompt without any room for unnecessary delay. Services are rendered to all stakeholders in minimum possible time without compromising on the quality.
- 3. The University maintains a ragging free campus. Utmost care is taken to make the newly admitted students feel at home right from the beginning through participatory involvement of all stakeholders. Ice-breaking sessions at Departments and Hostels are conducted under the supervision of faculty members and wardens to break the inertia between the new and the continuing students so that a cordial environment is created.
- 4. The students are part of various decision making processes of the University and find representation in all the fora like SPARSH, Research Committee, Departmental Advisory Committee, *etc.* 50 percent

- representation of female members in all fora is encouraged.
- 5. The University emphasises on imparting training for holistic development of all employees. Such programmes include: a. Induction programme for new teachers, b. Orientation Programme for the continuing teachers, c. In-house training programmes for administrative / ministerial staff, d. Refresher courses.
- 6. The University maintains a 24x7 security arrangement supervised by a Security Committee consisting of faculty members and officers. There is a single point entry under the round the clock watch of security personnel.
- 7. The University maintains an impeccably clean campus including all roads and buildings. Dustbins are put at different places to ensure a clean environment.
- 8. The University strictly maintains a 'No smoking and No Polythene' policy in public on the campus.
- 9. All equipments and instruments housed in various laboratories and central facilities are maintained in good condition and kept in operation.
- 10. Internal generation of revenue is encouraged and the University has indulged in Beauty and Wellness and Water Resources.
- 11. The central facilities of the University such as the auditorium, computer Lab and Library is maintained.
- 12. From the last 2 years, the University has the distinct track record of almost cent percent utilization of funds as made available by UGC under different schemes.
- 13. The University takes all effective steps to ensure that the Annual Report and Annual Accounts together with the Audit Certificate issued by the Comptroller & Auditor General of India are laid before both Houses of Parliament within the specified time frame.
- 14. The University has been preparing its accounts on Accrual basis based on Double Entry System of Accounting since inception.
- 15. The Hostel administration including its day to day functioning, running of the hostel mess *etc.* is bestowed on the hands of the students under the supervision of Warden(s).
- 16. Feedback among students is conducted periodically to listen and understand the voice of the students.
- 17. The University emphasises on Training Needs Identification (TNI) for non-teaching staff to know from the employees about their opinion on the topics on which they wish to get trainings.
- 18. The University follows the practice of uploading in its website the list(s) of applicants who apply for different post(s) in response to various recruitment drives.
- 19. File Tracing System is in place.

C. Support Services

- 1. The University has a Centre for Inclusive Development looking into the affairs of SC/STs, Counselling, Placement activities etc. The Equal Opportunity Cell under this Centre engages in affirmative actions towards the needy sections of students and society.
- 2. Student Mentoring is done at the Departmental level. Each faculty member is assigned a small group of students to mentor for their overall development.
- 3. All the hostels have been connected with wifi network for internet connectivity. There are also provisions for indoor games at the hostels. The hostel ambience is maintained beautifully with a dedicated team for gardening.
- 4. The University provides financial support to the needy students through various scholarships.
- 5. The University also provides vehicles for students to commute to their classes.
- 6. In order to facilitate sporting activities without hampering normal academic activities during day time, the University provides sports facility
- 7. A Yoga Centre has been set up for the benefit of all the campus dwellers and is open for employees and students to practice Yoga as an activity.
- 8. The University has round the clock medical facilities. There is a well-equipped health centre with

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- qualified doctors, medical.
- 9. First Aid Boxes are placed in all the hostels for emergency medical needs.
- 10. Psychological counselling sessions are organized for students every week to address their various psychological needs by the student counselling centre.
- 11. The University students are encouraged to earn while they learn. Provisions have been made for part-time engagements in the Computer Centre, Central Library, Centre for Open and Distance Learning, and Central Seat Allocation Board.

D. Outreach

- 1. Various activities under the Community Outreach Programme are periodically conducted by students and faculties / administration. The University conducts short-term certificate programmes in communicative English for the benefit of the students and teachers of the neighbourhood.
- 2. With an objective of maintaining a sound relationship with the neighbouring populace, periodic interactions are held with the Gaon Panchayat members / presidents and leading personalities of the villages in the vicinity by the Social work department.
- 3. The University takes initiative to establish a vibrant and mutually beneficial relationship with the industry. To this direction, the University has already entered into MoUs.
- 4. For giving an international exposure to the students, scholars and young teachers, the University is in the process of signing MoUs with a number of the reputed institutions/universities in the UK, Germany, Russia and US.
- 5. The University conducts summer internship programmes for the students of the undergraduate programmes of other Colleges / Institutions to encourage them for research.
- 6. The visit of students from Schools and Colleges from any part of the State / Region is encouraged.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

The National Service Scheme (NSS) Unit was created in the Central University of Jammu this year and has been functioning since August 2015. In a short span of time, the NSS unit has enrolled more than 120 volunteers from various departments of the university. One of the key objectives of NSS is to awaken the social consciousness of the students and provide them with an opportunity to engage with people around the campus constructively and to impart public social responsibility. The motto of NSS is "NOT ME BUT YOU", which expresses the essence of democratic living, upholds the need for selfless service and volunteerism and underlines that individual welfare is dependent on the welfare of society as whole. The NSS organises two types of programmes in an academic year: Regular activities and Special programmes.

1. Induction Day Programme

The NSS Unit at the Central University of Jammu organised Induction Day for NSS Volunteers to formally orient the volunteers to NSS framework. Prof. Jasbir Singh, Chairman NSS Jammu University delivered the orientation lecture on **Role NSS in Shaping Youth** and interacted with the volunteers. The event was presided over by Prof. Ashok Aima, Vice Chancellor of the university, who emphasised the need for such a forum for students to channelize their energy and knowledge for community development. He said that learning has to be delivered beyond class rooms and students should be sensitised about problems and challenges of the society. Prof. Jasbir Singh presented the historical background of NSS and its role in shaping the character of Indian youth through community engagement and selfless service. He encouraged volunteers to take part in all the activities and programme organised by NSS, which would help them to hone their overall personality. Mere education and degree will not suffice unless it is integrated into community service.

2. Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA), Village Jhang, Samba District

NSS volunteers have also actively participated in the Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) camp in the village Jhang, Samba District under Unnat Bharat Abhiyan programme of the university **22 October 2015.** Volunteers were interacted with the village people and the Panchayat members to understand their problems and their grievances. This provided an opportunity for the NSS Unit to adopt an adjacent village named Khala for special programmes on health and education.

3. Voluntary Blood Donation Camp

The NSS organised first Voluntary Blood Donation Camp on 28 October 2015. Dr. Vijay Sawhney, Head of Blood Bank, Govt. Medical College, Jammu The function began with the key note address by Dr. Vijay Sawhney, Head of Blood Bank, Govt. Medical College, Jammu. He addressed the young minds of the University with his inspiring speech about the importance and the benefits of donating blood.

The event was graced by Prof. H.K.Sharma, NSS director, New Delhi. While addressing the students Prof. Sharma traced the idea of blood donation way back to Vedic periods where the importance of donating blood is enshrined in vedic literatures. The event was presided by the Prof. Ashok Aima, Vice Chancellor Central University Jammu who himself donated blood. Speaking to the students Prof. Ashok Aima emphasised the importance of the selfless service through this kind of social activities among the students. The mobile donation camp received overwhelming response from the students' community where the girls participated in large numbers and more than 70 people donated their blood.

4. Special Lecture

NSS organised a special lecture on Public Social Responsibility and the Role of NSS delivered by Shri. Hemant Kumar Sharma, Deputy Programme Advisor to Ministry of Sport and Youth Affaris at Bagla Campus. While interacting with students, he emphasized the significance of traditional knowledge to impart social responsibility among the youth for social harmony and preservation of nature. NSS is the largest youth organisation in the world, which aimed to train youth on selfless service to the society through structure programmes and tailor made activities. He urged the students to actively participate in the programmes at the university levels to gain experience in community engagement.

The NSS unit of the Central University of Jammu has been invited to participate in the National Youth Festival organised by the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs to be held from 12-16 January at Raipur,

ACTIVITIES



- 1. Though it has been introduced in UGC NET, non inclusion of NSS as an optional subject in the UPSC examinations restricts the popularity of the subject amongst civil service aspirants.
- 2. Lack of clear guidelines which facilitates deputation/short term appointment of serving officials and practitioners to serve as visiting faculty.
- 3. Short term attachment with the security establishments for developing synergy.
- 4. The lack of open source information with regard to security establishments restricts scholarship to some extent.

The Chair has been sanctioned in the area of "Governance and Ethics" with special emphasis on the teachings of Swami Vivekananda i.e National and Social Awakening, Philosophy, Youth Development and Leadership etc. An initial grant of Rs.25 Lac as first instalment has been sanctioned for its establishment and the chair is headed by Professor Sudesh Kumar Sharma, former State Information Commissioner (J&K) Professor & Head, Department of Law and Dean, Faculty of Law, University of Jammu. His area of specialisation includes Constitutional Law, Human Rights and Jurisprudence. Professor S.K Sharma has more than 33 years of teaching and research experience in the discipline of law. During his tenure at University of Jammu he has held important administrative and academic positions. He has been associated with many universities across the country as a resource person and member of various academic bodies. Professor Sharma was awarded Fellowships by the American Study Research Centre, Hyderabad and International Institute of Human Rights, Strasbourg, France and completed 3 research projects. Professor Sharma is a prolific writer and has 3 books and large number of research papers to his credit. His book entitled "The Constitution of Jammu and Kashmir" has been widely acclaimed and acknowledged by the legal fraternity. He has delivered over 300 guest lectures in various universities and institutes at national and state level. He has contributed more than 70 papers in the international and national seminars. During his tenure (25th October, 2011-31st October, 2015) as State Information Commissioner, Professor Sharma adjudicated and disposed off large number of appeals/complaints filed under the Jammu & Kashmir Right to Information Act, 2009 and made unstinted efforts to establish a regime of transparency in the functioning of public authorities/administration in order to contain corruption and ensure accountability and ethics in public life.
